Some weeks ago there was consideration of the idea that an exhibition game might be arranged in Timmins with the Sault Ste. The Sault wanted a guarantee of \$350.00 for a game here. As the lad said when he dreamed he had inherited Henry Ford's money, "It is too much." No one here had any idea of buying the Sault team; they just wanted to rent it for a game. It wouldn't cost the Sault a hundred dollars to come in here for an exhibition game. No one here, accordingly, would want to professionalize the Sault team by overpaying them a couple of hundred dollars. So that's that!

FREE SUPPLIES NOW FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS

Pupils at Timmins Public School Hereafter Will Not Need to Buy Books, Papers, Pencils or Other Supplies.

Last week the Public Schools here received the first shipment of books and supplies, and this week the balance of the order arrived. Hereafter pupils will not need to supply text books, pencils, scribblers, paper, ink, paints, or anything else. Everything needed at school will be supplied free at the Timmins Public Schools. Parents and others may make a note of this:—Everything that the pupils need at the Timmins Public Schools is supplied free of charge. Only in cases where the pupil destroys or wilfully wastes is there any charge made for books or supplies. The new system will mean a very material saving to parents and will be especially welcomed by those having large families. On the latter, the purchase of books and supplies has in the past been a serious burden in many cases. The new plan is expected to mean a very material saving to the people of Timmins. It will eliminate much waste, and will also make a better and more even standard in the use of books and supplies. Every pupil will have good quality supplies, enough of them, and all without waste. The plan has the additional advantage of placing all children on an equal footing in the matter of text books and supplies. The purchase of the books and supplies in quantity by the Public School Board means a material saving in the total cost. It is estimated that approximately \$1,500.00 will pay for all text books and supplies for the Public Schools for a year. If the parents had to purchase the same books and supplies in the ordinary way it would cost considerably over \$3,000.00 all told. For some years past Toronto, Hamilton and other cities have supplied the pupils with all the necessary goods for school work. A number of towns like Renfrew, Pembroke, etc., have followed the same plan, and have found it economical and satisfactory.
