

MCINTYRE NOW LEADS MINES HOCKEY LEAGUE

Won Over Hollinger in Good Game and Town Still Well in the Running.

On Thursday night at the Timmins Rink, the McIntyre team ascended to the top of the Mines League, when they defeated the Hollinger sextette, after a hard battle, to the tune of six goals to three. The game was a good one, both teams working hard, playing clean hockey and neither slacking up until the final gong rang half past ten. The best attendance at any game here this winter saw this exhibition of good hockey, and the fans went away well satisfied. The game was handled ably by

Messrs. G. S. Lowe and E. K. Keely. There were only two penalties handed out during the evening, both in the third period, the McIntyre and Hollinger team each having a culprit. "Fat" Levine in the Hollinger citadel had a lot of work to do, and he handled himself very creditably. Gorman and Carlin played a good game, both carrying the puck into McIntyre territory and calling on the goalie to make some clever saves. Carlin played a nice clean game, and one of his goals was as pretty work as seen on local ice. G. Kendall worked hard. His play was a big improvement on previous evening's work. Ross and Bowles were hard checkers and once getting the puck travelled fast. A. Kendall played a nice game. McDonald and Luxton were not used much, but both showed up well when on the ice. McIntyre in the net for the victors was not

kept as busy as Levine, but he did not have any easy evening. Snyder and Doug Briden played a good game on defence. Duval at centre worked hard all evening. He is one of the most dangerous men on the McIntyre line-up. Kelly and Parker both put up the game of the season. Both checked hard, and called on Levine to do some spectacular work. Jones and W. Briden were not used much but while on the ice showed up well.

The first period opened with both teams checking close, Kelly breaking away and sending in a hot one, which Levine saved. Carlin then took the puck, and by clever stick handling, got through the whole McIntyre team and sent the rubber behind McIntyre for the Hollinger's first counter. The McIntyre sextette came back strong and carried the play into the Holly territory. Briden and Duval being beat by Levine, after a nice piece of combination play. Ross called on McIntyre to save, Snyder getting the puck, passing to Parker who went down. Levine was kept busy for the next few seconds, the Schumacher team working hard to get one in. Gorman and George Kendall took the play to the other end, and McIntyre had three hard ones in quick succession. Gorman tried a long one, but McIntyre saved. The play was again brought to the Holly end, and Duval got one in after Levine had made some nice saves. With the score a tie, the play slowed down some, being rather slow until the period ended.

The second period opened with Kelly taking a pass from Duval and sending a nice one on Levine, who saved. Three minutes from the face-off Kelly scored on a shot from centre ice, when he took Parker's pass, and sent the puck behind Levine. The play was at the Hollinger end for a few seconds the good work of "Fat" in the nets being particularly noticeable. Both teams checked hard. Six minutes after Kelly's goal Carlin again evened the score, when he sent one behind McIntyre. Half a minute after George Kendall got another past McIntyre from a melee in front of the net. Right after Duval, Kelly and W. Briden went down in nice combination Briden taking Kelly's pass and scoring. There was some argument about this goal. The goal umpire claiming it didn't cross the line, but after some delay it was allowed and play was resumed. Two minutes after, Doug Briden made it four for McIntyre when he scored on Parker's pass. The play was faster now, the Hollinger coming back strong in an attempt to even the score again. Kelly sent the puck down the ice into the Holly territory. Carlin and Gorman coming back, and in a nice two-man combination got through the Schumacher defence only to be beat by McIntyre. The play again swung to the Hollinger end, Duval sending in the fifth for the McIntyre, just before the period ended.

The third period was fast hockey. Both teams playing their hardest. From the close checking game in centre ice Parker broke away and with only Levine to beat, he failed to score. Abbie Kendall drew the first penalty of the game when he bodied Snyder. Gorman and Carlin went down Carlin falling and having to leave the ice for a few minutes. Gorman again called on McIntyre to save. The play was round the McIntyre goal, until Snyder got away and with Parker came down, losing at the Holly defence. Doug Briden drew the first McIntyre penalty when he took a trip to the cooler for bodying Carlin. The Holly played a four-man forward line in an endeavour to get through, but McIntyre was putting up a stellar performance. Briden returning to the ice carried the puck into Hollinger territory and scored on the rebound from Parker's shot. The game ended shortly after with the Schumacher team three goals up. The goals were scored by D. Briden, 2; Duval, 2; Kelly, 1; W. Briden, 1 for the McIntyre, and Carlin, 2; G. Kendall, 1 for the Hollinger.

DOMINION BANK'S REPORT FOR YEAR EXCELLENT ONE

The Dominion Bank's Fifty-third Annual Meeting. Profits Maintained and Strong Liquid Position.

At the fifty-third Annual Meeting of The Dominion Bank held at the Head Office in the City of Toronto on Wednesday, January 30th, the Directors presented the best report in the Bank's history.

The profits have been maintained at a high figure, and the strong liquid position which has always been notable in the Bank's statements, has been still further increased.

Such a satisfactory result of the year's operations was doubtless most pleasing to the Shareholders, as 1923 admittedly was a very difficult year in business and banking circles throughout Canada.

As has been stated, the profits were well maintained. After deducting charges of management and making full provision for bad and doubtful debts, there remained a sum of \$1,129,370. While this amount is some \$40,000 less than in 1922 it is \$4,000 in advance of 1921. With the addition of \$758,163, brought forward from the previous year's account, a total of \$1,887,533 was distributed as follows: Dividends at the rate of 12% per annum and a bonus of 1% \$780,000; Dominion and Provincial Government taxes \$162,158; contributed to Officers' Pension Fund \$15,000; written off Bank Premises Account \$75,000; leaving a balance of \$825,374 carried forward to Profit and Loss Account.

This balance is \$67,000 more than in 1922 and \$110,000 in excess of the amount carried forward in 1921. Indeed, it is interesting to note that the amount carried forward this year is the largest sum the Bank has ever been able to carry forward to Profit and Loss Account in its fifty-three years of business.

The Bank's highly liquid position is indicated by the figures which show the liquid assets to stand at the large total of \$68,800,000 or 63.7% of the Bank's liabilities to the public, while cash assets are \$26,260,000 or practically 25% of liabilities to the public.
