SANDY FALLS HEARD IN WEST VIRGINIA, U.S.A.

Some days ago Mr. M. J. Cavaney had a talk over the radio with Mr. Edward C. Jones, of Fairmont, West Virginia. The Timmins Radio Station was clearly heard in the West Virginia town and Fairmont was just as plainly heard here. That was a matter of interest and importance, but, of course, the clever news writer had to fix up the truth, to make it "peppy" and so on. Accordingly this despatch appeared in the Radio Bulletin for release on Feb. 9th:—

"Fairmont, West Va., February—The element of surprise is generally conceded to be one of the major fascinations of radio. When one puts a record on a phonograph he knows exactly what he will hear. He may have listened to the same tune many times. On the other hand the radio receiver, like Pandora's Box, is full of mystery. When one turns the dials on his set he opens the door to the unexpected. Reception of programs is being standardized but that point is not yet reached. This phase or philosophy of radio was emphasized here recently when Edward C. Jones, Jr., district superintendent of the American Radio Relay League, the national association of radio amateurs, picked up his phone and heard a Canadian amateur station calling. Jones replied with his code transmitter. The surprise came when the Canadian, located in Northern Ontario, suddenly shifted from code to phone and a voice from the air called: "Hello United States SSP, this is Canadian 3GG calling you." In a few minutes Jones, who is a clothing merchant in this place, learned that he had communicated with a radio fan in the gold mining area so far north that the Canuck, instead of giving his town and street address, called out his latitude and longitude. Not every clothier can get a thrill like that, out of the air anyway. While the average listener would have been overcome with astonishment Jones had an added advantage. He could talk back! He has one of the finest transmitting stations in this section and has been copied repeatedly in England and France as well as many times by ships in the North Sea, Pacific Ocean and South American waters. Amateurs in Holland, Hawaii and Mexico have reported SSP's signals."

As a matter of fact, Mr. M. J. Cavaney says he was particular on the occasion referred to, as in all similar cases, to mention that Station 3GG is at Sandy Falls, Timmins. 3GG is a little to the North all right, but can be located without referring to latitude and longitude. At Timmins, Ontario, should be a good enough description for those who keep posted on the important places outside their own section.

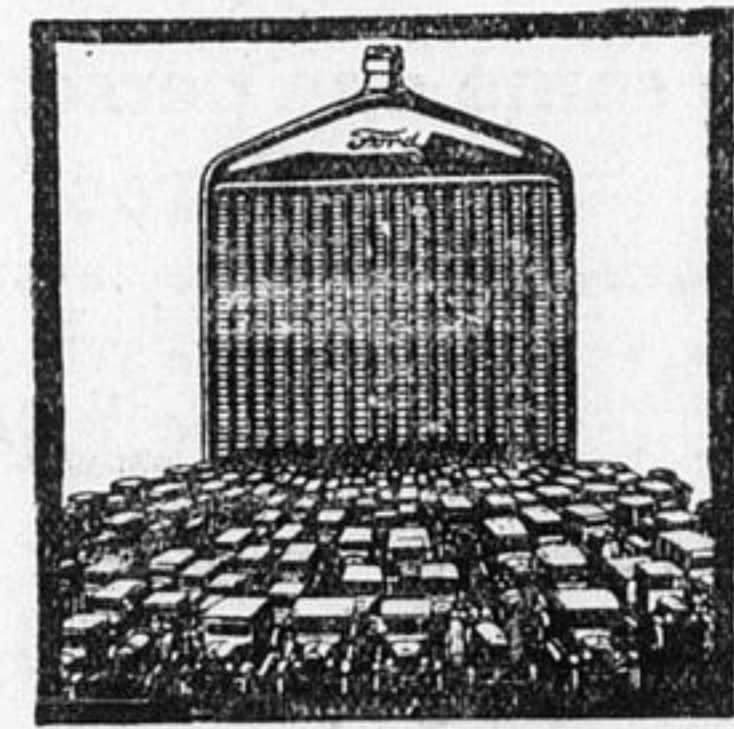
