### SO. PORCUPINE HOME AND SCHOOL ASSOCN. MEETING

The Home and School Association of South Porcupine held its February meeting on the 21st inst. The address of Mr. Thos. Bengough at the recent meeting of the Executive of the Ontario Federation of Home and School Associations was very ably read by Mrs. Max Smith. Mr. Bengough made a world tour with the Royal Commission on Industrial and Technical Education, and his addresses are always well worth while. In this address he discussed the changes brought about by Circular 39 of the Education Dept., and dealt with prob-

able changes to be made in the Public School curriculum by Hon. Howard Ferguson, during the present session of the Legislature. The local association had secured copies of Circular 39, and a lively discussion followed the address. (Mr. Bengough suggests that the Home and School Associations in the different localities send resolutions to their members in the Legislature, voicing their opinions on advisable changes in the shortening of the curriculum. This was left over till next meeting, as, owing to the inclemency of the weather, there was not a full attendance. However, the report that Music and Art may be left off was very much regretted, and it is hoped that it may be only a report, not a reality. At the close there was a short social period during which Mrs. T. Wright pleasingly entertained the members with instrumental music.

### BANKS TO CLOSE AT 6 P.M. ON PAY DAYS, AFTER MARCH 20

Last week announcement was made by the local branches of the chartered banks that on and after March



20th, all banks would be open on Hollinger pay-days from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. only. This means that the banks will discontinue the practice of keeping open on pay-days after supper. It has been found that the keeping open of the banks on pay-days after 6 p.m. is a hardship to the staffs without special compensating convenience to the customers. Employees of the mine can easily cash their cheques on their way home or at any rate before 6 p.m., it is figured, and by closing at 6 p.m. on pay nights the public is inconvenienced without undue strain of long hours on the bank staffs.
