

**UNITED EXPLORERS MAKE
IMPORTANT GOLD FIND**

Interesting Gold Discovery on Claims in Townships of McArthur and Bartlett.

While performing assessment work on a group of five claims owned by the United Explorers' Corporation in the Townships of McArthur and Bartlett workman some days ago uncovered what appears to be a very important gold discovery. The find is along a marked depression crossing the claims for a distance of about a mile in length. Official information is that the depression or line of weakness occurs along a Porphyry-Kewatin contact, but the rock outcrops and has been picked up at only three places along the depression, the balance being covered with heavy overburden. In the three outcroppings very spectacular free gold showings occur, heavy panning and unusually high assays being obtained.

At the outcroppings referred to considerable trenching and other work has been done, while two other veins have also received much attention. Pannings from the outcroppings and the veins referred to have shown very satisfactory results in assays. One vein is about fifteen feet wide and is heavily mineralized with iron pyrite, galena and molybdenite. The other is a shear zone about ninety feet wide and consists of schists and greenstone very heavily mineralized with iron pyrite. About 150 lb. of samples are on exhibition at the company's office at South Porcupine and are attracting much attention.

The discoveries appear important enough to arouse very general attention, and there is special interest in view of the fact that the United Explorers' Corporation is a new company, formed on original lines and with more than usual promise of outstanding success.

**FORMER TIMMINS BANDSMAN
DIED AT THE BAY THURSDAY**

There will be very general and sincere regret here at the death in North Bay last Thursday morning of Louis Desicco, aged 27 years. For some years the late Louis Desicco was in charge of C. Martino's butcher shop at Timmins and he had many friends here. He was one of the clarinet players in the Timmins Citizens' Band and also on occasion played the side drums. He was taken ill some weeks ago with Bright's disease which affected his eyesight leaving him practically blind. He was removed to the North Bay hospital on Feb. 5th, but developed diphtheria and was returned to his home where he died on Feb. 28th.

The late Louis Desicco was born in Italy, coming to Canada with his parents when about three years old. He was educated in North Bay, and for a time he was employed on the staff of A. A. McIntosh, North Bay, later coming to Timmins, where he was highly regarded by all who knew him. Some time ago he bought a farm near North Bay and intended to take up farming this spring.

The funeral took place last Friday to the R.C. cemetery at North Bay.

His parents, now in Italy, and one sister, also in Italy, are among the near relatives surviving, while a widow and two small daughters are also left to mourn the loss.

**CANADIAN LORRAIN NOW
LISTED ON THE EXCHANGE**

The property in South Lorrain formerly known as the Maidens property but recently re-organized as the Canadian Lorrain was listed this week on the Standard Stock Exchange, shares selling at 50c. The capitalization is \$2,000,000.00. The property lies east of the Mining Corporation holdings and the Keeley and a short distance west of the Nipissing holdings in that section of country. The directorate of the Canadian Lorrain includes many of those interested in the Vipond and Keeley mines, and Dr. J. MacIntosh Bell, managing-director of the Keeley, is also managing-director of the Canadian Lorrain. Recently there has been special interest in the Keeley and the whole district in which that wonderful silver producer is located. The February production of the Keeley was 150,495 ounces of silver.

**KERR LAKE DROPS OPTION
ON GOLDALE PROPERTY**

An official statement given out last week by the President J. Y. Murdock of the Goldale Company, is to the effect that the Kerr Lake Company has dropped its option, but that further financing is being discussed and shareholders will be advised shortly. Mr. Murdock's statement is given as follows:—

"Lateral work on the 1,000-ft. level on Group No. 1 of the company having several weeks ago reached locations where pilot diamond drilling could be done advantageously this lateral diamond drilling was commenced and the programme then decided upon has been about completed. Developments since the shaft on this group was continued from the 130-ft. level to the 1,000-ft. level and lateral work carried on on the 500-ft. and 1,000-ft. levels have just been examined by the company's engineer and a decision as to further financing and the future development of the property, including the installation of electrical equipment, will be made by the directors after the report and recommendations of the company's engineer have been received. It is the intention to advise the shareholders when a decision has been arrived at. Kerr Lake Mines, Limited, are discontinuing the expenditure of money under their option, but pending decision of the directors, pumping operations will be continued by the company."

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
