Equipment to be Delivered Here This Month, Installation Will be Made in Few Weeks.

Mr. Wooten, electrical engineer and telephone installation expert of the Northern Electrical Company, manufacturers of modern telephone equipment, was in town last week in connection with the new system to be installed here by the Porcupine Telephone Lines. Mr. B. V. Harrison, superintendent of the Porcupine Telephone Lines, was also up from Haileybury in connection with the matter.

The equipment for the new system to be installed here will be delivered here this month, it is expected, and then the work of installation will be taken up and completed as speedily as possible. Arrangements will be made to make the transfer from the present system to the new system with the minimum of inconvenience to business. It is expected that the new system will be in operation by the middle of May.

The new system includes the installation of the latest type of Central Energy Switchboard at the Timmins Central. The equipment will be similar to that of the large cities, with no "ringing up" or "ringing off." To call central all that will be required will be to lift the receiver off the hook.
