The Mining Commissioner of Ontario, Mr. T. Godson, K.C., is in Timmins to-day to hear a number of cases in regard to mining properties. The cases were all listed to open at 10 a.m. this (Wednesday) morning, the sessions being held in the Council Chamber, Timmins.

A team went through the ice on the river near the bridge on Monday morning and the horses were drowned. A special general meeting of the shareholders of the Thompson-Krist Co. is called for to-day at Toronto to consider plans for the re-opening of the Thompson-Krist and Porcupine Crown properties under a new plan.

### FINES AND JAIL TERMS FOLLOW RAID IN MONETA

At Police Court here last week fines and jail terms were apportioned to the men and women found in the house in Moneta the previous Sunday evening when the place was raided by the police. Grace Donato, charged with being the keeper of a disorderly house, was fined \$100.00 and costs. Agnes Pagueau, for frequenting, was fined \$25.00 and costs. Ernestine Bouchard, another girl charged with being a frequenter, did not appear for trial. Her bail of \$50.00 was estimated, and bench warrant issued. Five men, all from Sweden, were fined \$20.00 and costs for being frequenters. Charges of being frequenters were dropped in connection with Frank Emorio, Elwood Vidito and M. Biancofiore, these three having liquor in their possession when taken in charge by the police. On charges of illegally having liquor in other than their private dwelling house these three were fined \$200.00 and costs each or three months. Vidito paid up, but the other two apparently preferred the three months.

Victor Borghette, on a charge of having liquor in a public place, was fined \$200.00 and costs.

On a similar charge E. Gill was fined \$200.00 and costs.

A charge of selling liquor, preferred against Mrs. Mary Peterson, was dismissed.

D. Stenovich and G. Sadergrin were each fined \$200.00 and costs for illegally having liquor.

There were only three drunks, two of them being fined \$10 and costs, and the third taxed double on account of it being a second recent appearance.

### ANOTHER BUSY POLICE COURT FOR TO-MORROW.

In addition to the preliminary hearing of the three men and a woman charged with illegally detaining a young woman for immoral purposes, there will be the usual array of cases for police court this week. Three drunks are on the list. Mike Roa is charged with being drunk and assaulting Grace Donato. K. Rousseau is charged with obstructing the street by piling hay. S. Kelly faces three charges as a result of the trouble at the rink Saturday evening, and some of his friends are charged with obstructing the police for interference in the case. A gentleman from Schumacher has laid a charge of assault against Kelly, and in addition there are charges of being drunk and having liquor in a public place against him.
