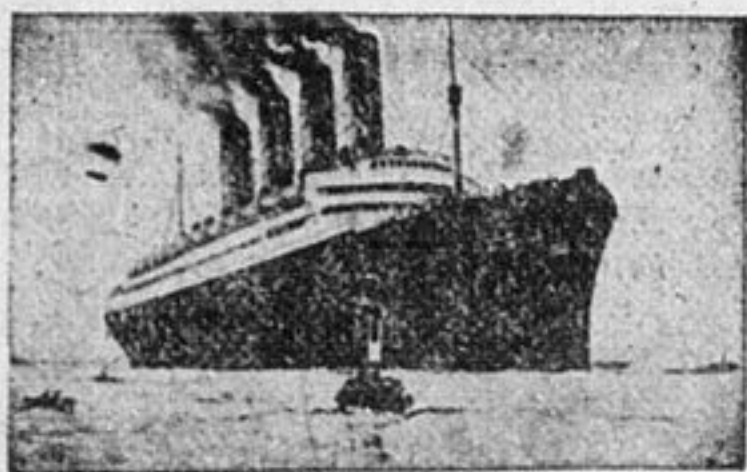

FIGURES MAY NOT LIE BUT SOMETIMES THEY'RE QUEER

ANNUAL STATEMENT OF NORTHERN ONT. LIGHT

The annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Light & Power Co. was held last week in Toronto. The following is The Toronto Telegram's report of the meeting:—

Northern Ontario Light and Power Company, Limited, statement for the year ended December 31st, shows operating revenue of \$1,113,133 as against \$886,522 in 1922, and net profit of \$475,429 as against \$317,098, an increase of 49.93 per cent. for the year. The company resumed preferred dividends and paid arrears (June 30, 1921), a total of \$214,452, and transferred \$239,000 to reserve, leaving a surplus of \$568,617, comparing with \$546,639 at end of 1922.

During the year the company took over properties of Temiskaming Pulp and Paper Company, which it established. Increased earnings, due partly to Temiskaming Pulp earnings. Second 44,000-volt transmission line is under construction in Kirkland Lake, and a new line into South Lorrain is planned. Capacity of Matabichouan plant has also been increased. The board of directors has been increased to eight and Irving W. Bonbright, of New York, elected to the board. Expenditure on extensions during the year aggregated \$193,292. Dividend arrears on preferred aggregate 9 per cent.

According to The Northern News, of Cobalt, the Kirkland Lake Hotel was the first place in the Kirkland Lake Camp to have the township water turned on. There was a little difficulty at first with frozen pipes, but after a day or two everything worked smoothly.

\$1,000 GIFT TO HAILEYBURY SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL FUND

The Committee in Haileybury giving effort to raise funds for a Soldiers' Memorial in that town are apparently meeting with good success. Last week a telegram was received by Mrs. Houston from Mr. D. A. Dunlap saying that he was sending a cheque for \$1,000.00 for the fund. The idea is to buy a park site and erect thereon some form of memorial. One proposal is to erect a cairn of native stones, and this seems to meet with general approval. The success of the campaign for the Memorial Park seems to be an assured success now.

IMPORTANT DISCOVERIES AT TOUGH-OAKES PROPERTY

What has been referred to as the outstanding feature of development in the Kirkland Lake district during the past few months is found in the several important discoveries made on the Tough-Oakes-Burnside Mine. New veins of much importance have been encountered indicating that the company will be able to carry on production on an enlarged scale and suggesting that even more promising results may be looked for in the future. A summary of the results in recent months shows six new sources of ore, these being Vein No. 11 at the 400-ft.; Vein No. 14, 15, 16 and 17 at the 800-ft.; and Vein No. 18 at the 900-ft. level. In all these veins particularly good grade of ore is in evidence.

PROMINENT PIONEER OF NORTH LAND PASSES AWAY

Friends and acquaintances from all over the North Land gathered at Haileybury on Thursday last to attend the funeral of the late David John, one of the prominent and outstanding men of the North Land for many years past. Few men in Haileybury enjoyed in larger measure the respect and esteem of the people of the town, and few were more widely known throughout the North.

The late Mr. John was a native of Swansea, Wales, and came to Canada in 1889 to open the Murray Mine at Sudbury. He was chemist at the Murray Mine for a number of years. Later he gave good service in his profession in British Columbia, and other mining districts. He opened one of the first assay offices in this part of the North at Haileybury in 1907 and from then until the time of his death he conducted this office with an ability and integrity that won him the highest regard and gave the district a service of particular excellence.

The late Mr. John was a prominent member of the Masonic Order, holding the highest offices, and winning the sincere regard of all his fellow-members in the district. Some years ago he was D.D.G.M. for Temiskaming District of the A.F. & A.M. The funeral last week was held under Masonic Honours, the pallbearers being Past District Deputy Grand Masters of this Masonic District.

A widow (formerly Miss Edie S. Thompson, of Sudbury) and three daughters survive and to these, and to his two brothers and two sisters now residing in the Old Land, the sincere sympathy of all is extended in their deep loss.

The late Mr. John was one of the Town Councillors of Haileybury for several years, and in other public and semi-public positions he gave his interest and ability to community service and won the esteem and appreciation of all who knew him.
