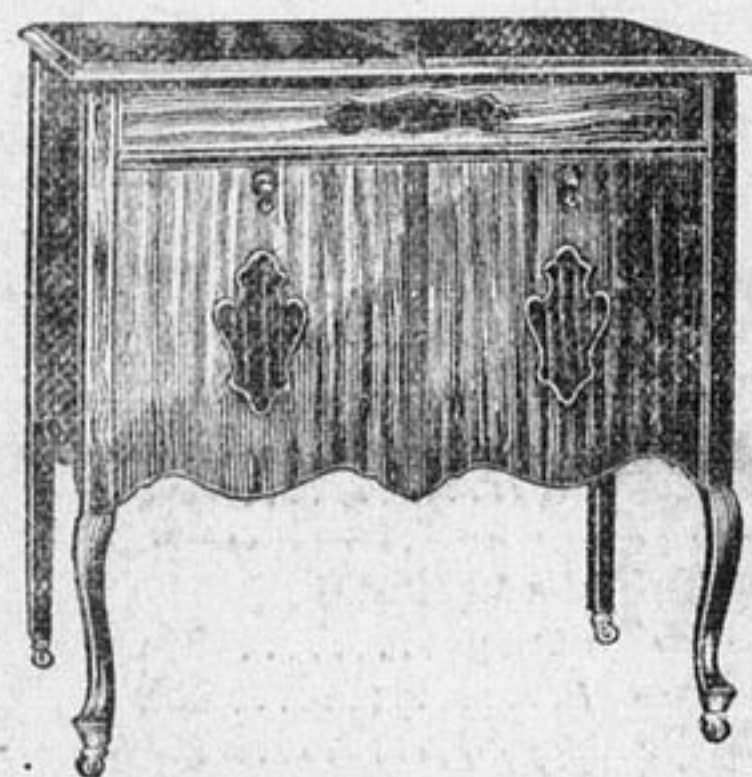

**STALLONE SENTENCED
TO THE ELECTRIC CHAIR**

Man Captured in Porcupine Camp
Sentenced in Pennsylvania for
Murder of Two. Third Trial
Pending.

In July of last year "Patsy" Stallone was arrested at South Porcupine by Chief Chas. McInnis of Tisdale Township. Stallone was held until two police officers came from Old Forge, Pennsylvania, to take him back there to stand trial for murder. According to the information given here the crime, or rather the crimes, charged against Stallone occurred on Nov. 6th, 1922, when there was a party at Stallone's house in one of the suburbs of Scranton. Liquor was said to have flowed very freely and a quarrel developed. In this quarrel Stallone is alleged to have used a gun with the result that three of the guests were killed. Stallone then left and there was a long hunt for him all over the continent before he was eventually captured at South Porcupine. One Scranton newspaper said he had himself shipped out of Old Forge in a coffin. When arrested in this Camp Stallone did not appear to be a very wicked type of fellow, but he was carefully guarded and returned safely to Pennsylvania for trial. A despatch from Scranton, Pennsylvania, last week continues the story as follows:—

"Pasquale Stallone (Patsy), of Old Forge, near Scranton, was sentenced by one judge to twelve years' imprisonment for second degree murder, and immediately afterward was sentenced to die in the electric chair for a first degree murder by another judge. A third murder case is pending against him. Legal lights are wondering whether Stallone will serve his 12 years before the death sentence is carried out. Stallone, it was charged, invited Lorenza Semenza, Ralff Letteri and John Melucci, to his store about a year ago. An hour later Semenza and Letteri were found shot to death, and Melucci fatally wounded. Melucci, it is charged, said Stallone shot all three men. Stallone fled and was captured some time later in Northern Ontario. He claimed one of the men had killed the other two, and that he shot in self defense. The state contended the shooting was the result of a quarrel over whiskey. Stallone was granted a separate trial in each case, and the first two cases ended some time ago, sentence being deferred until Saturday.

**APPARENTLY NO TIMMINS
DOCK IN THE ESTIMATES**

Last week the estimates for 1924 were brought down in the Dominion House of Commons. According to despatches from Ottawa there is no special provision made for expenditures of any account in Northern Ontario. Among the grants asked in connection with rivers and harbours in Northern Ontario there is included the sum of \$12,000 for Haileybury and \$1,150 for New Liskeard. Apparently, there is no provision for a new dock at Timmins Landing. During the past three or four years representations have been made to the Government emphasizing the need for a new dock at Timmins Landing on the Mattagami River. The amount and importance on the river has been pointed out and other information given the Government in regard to the need here for a new dock, but so far no action has been taken. It was understood last year that provision for such a work had been made in the estimates, but if so, the work was sidetracked. The Board of Trade has urged upon the Government at various times the need for the dock here and because there is practically nothing spent in all this area by the Dominion Government it was believed that the modest request for something like proper docking facilities might justly receive consideration. The Dominion Government gathers a large revenue from this part of the North Land from income tax, sales tax and other forms of direct and indirect taxation. Can anyone point to any recent case where the Dominion Government spent any amount for any work of public benefit in this immediate district? Don't all speak at once! The Member for Temiskaming should make it plain to the House that it is unfair and improper to absolutely disregard this big section of country in the matter of expenditures. Economy is a fine thing but it should apply to more than one section of country. Very few demands indeed have been made upon the Dominion Government for expenditures in this district. The building of a new dock at the Timmins landing is a work that should be attended to at once. It is a very necessary work and would be of service to large numbers of people and of general advantage to the district as a whole.

**SOME SHAREHOLDERS OF
DOME SEEKING CHANGE**

Committee Thinks Mine in Best Con-
dition in Its History, But
Would Like Change in
Directors, Etc.

A circular letter sent under date of March 22nd, to Dome Mines shareholders, states that at the request of a number of Canadian shareholders, a Committee has been formed in order that shareholders who are unable to attend the annual meeting on April 8th may avail themselves of the services of the Committee by sending proxies on forms enclosed with the circular. The Committee signing the letter includes:—A. C. McMaster, K. C., Toronto; H. C. McCloskey, Cobalt; R. Home Smith, Dr. C. H. Hair, Richard Southam, and W. M. Forest, (secretary), Toronto; L. Erenhouse, Haileybury; M. J. Wallace, North Bay; R. D. MacLaren and Alfred L. K. Shillington, Ottawa.

The letter says:—"From enquiries made the Committee is satisfied that the mine itself is to-day in better condition than at any period of its history, that the mine management is of the best, and that there appears to be no doubt as to the future earning capacity. In the opinion of the Committee, the Board of Directors is alone responsible for the existing disquieting condition."

The objections of the Committee centre round the fact that the officers of President and Treasurer are held by one man, the President, and that the business of the company is transacted from the President's brokerage office in New York, instead of the company having independent offices of its own in New York. Further, the Committee claims that the interests of the individual shareholder do not receive the careful and efficient attention desired. Reference is also made in the letter to the matter of the transfer of 46,000 shares of the company to be held in trust by the President, with dividends paid thereon, but the dividends immediately re-paid to the Company. The letter suggests that no such proceeding is necessary and that the explanation of the matter was followed by a depreciation of the market selling price of the shares of the company.

In a word, while having the fullest confidence in the mine and its management, the Committee is apparently dissatisfied with the situation as regards the Board of Directors. Just what justification there may be for such dissatisfaction will no doubt be made plain at the annual meeting when the whole situation will likely be cleared up. The Committee point out in their letter that they have a substantial outright shareholding in Dome Mines, Limited, and already represent many others. They will no doubt be heard from at the annual meeting and the result will be a complete clearing of the situation. There is the best foundation for a thorough understanding and the fullest confidence, as there is no question of the splendid condition of the mine itself or any doubt as to the efficiency and capability of the management of the property.

**PREDICTS TREMENDOUS
DEVELOPMENT IN NORTH**

At a special luncheon last week of the Canadian Club in New York City, Rev. Canon Cody, of Toronto, formerly Minister of Education for Ontario, told the gathering that Ontario is fundamentally sound, and on the verge of tremendous development, particularly in the northern mineral belt.

He predicted that the airplane and hydro-airplane would play a great part in the development of Northern Ontario to its seaboard on the Arctic Ocean. Development of the untouched natural resources of the province was already under way, assisted by capital from the United States and Great Britain, he said, and added that he expected this development to reach an advanced stage within the next few years.

He warned against pessimism with regard to Canadian advancement, and declared that unbounded prosperity lay in the mineral, forest reserve, agricultural and water power development of Ontario.

The time is coming, he said, when Canada would take steps to see that the products of wood grown in the Dominion would be manufactured entirely on the Canadian side of the border.
