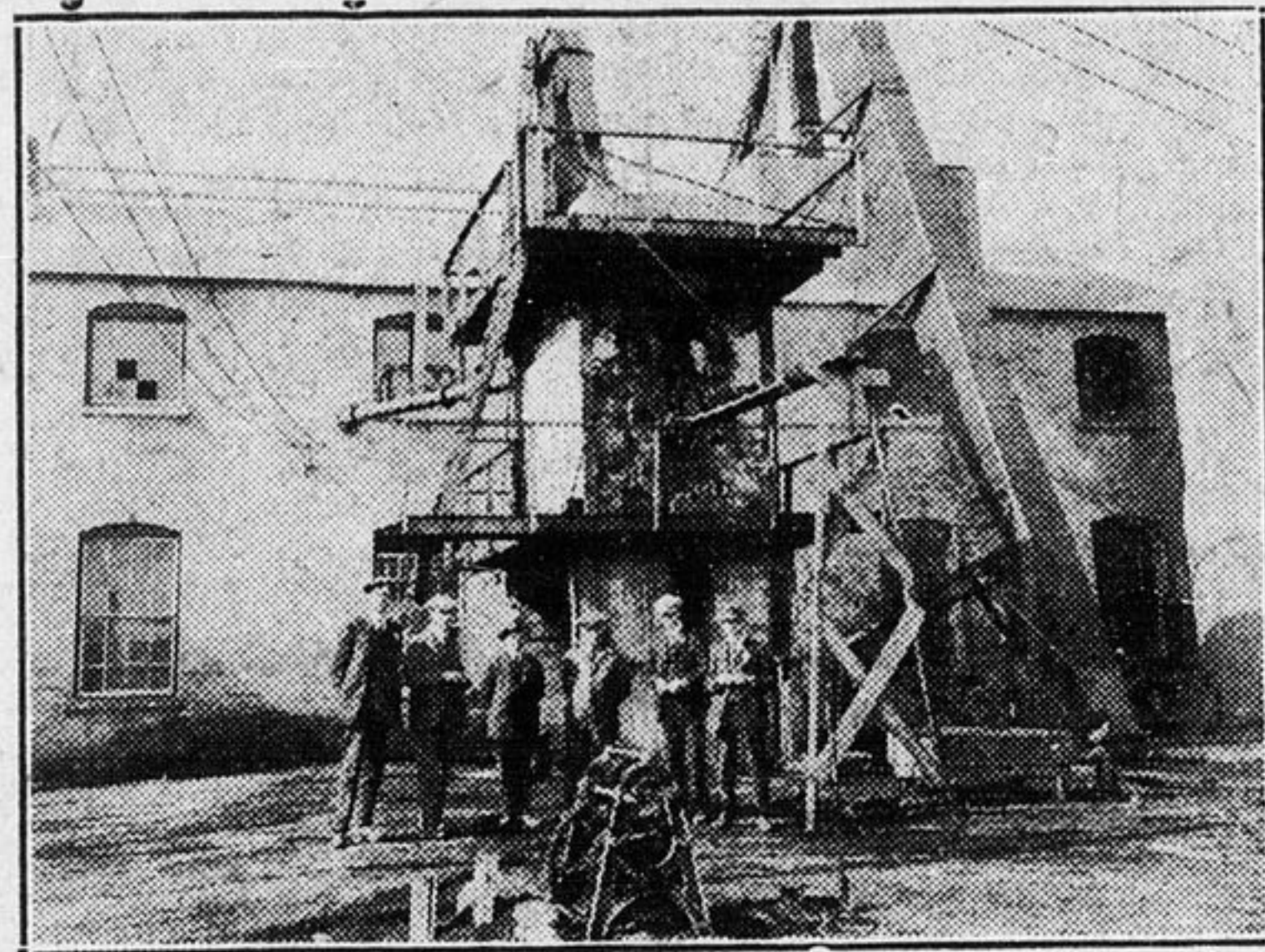

HAS THE WEST SOLVED THE PROBLEM OF BRIQUETTING?



Three governments, those of Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Dominion of Canada have spent a lot of money on solving the problem of converting enormous quantities of lignite coal into high grade fuel equal to anthracite in heating value and economical in production. It is said that the problem has been solved. However, a million dollars was spent on the erection of a plant at Bienfait, Saskatchewan, which has proved useless. A model plant worked successfully, but when the method was applied to commercial production it broke down. Now a much simpler and less expensive method is being worked out in a plant erected, near

the original one, at a cost of a few thousand dollars, and it is in this plant that thirty tons of coal are now being produced daily at a total cost which is less than the cost of drying alone in the bigger plant. The new type of plant is economical in construction, can be operated with unskilled labor, and provides a number of valuable by-products. The new process promises to make the coal industry in Saskatchewan and Alberta a profitable year-round business and will convert the enormous coal fields of the prairie provinces into resources of enormous wealth. 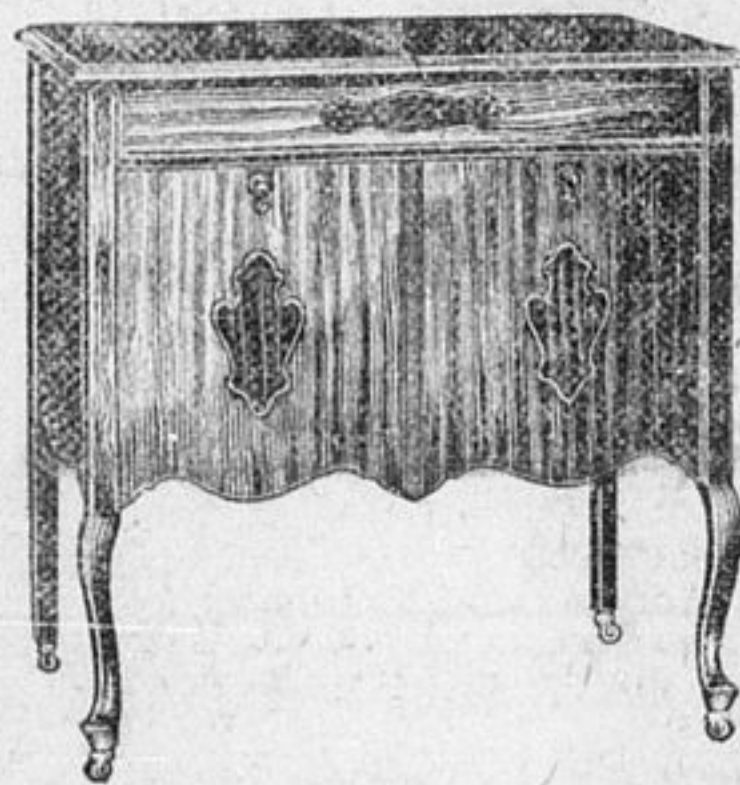
