**FORMER TIMMINS YOUNG  
MEN STAGE BAD HOLD-UP**

Appearing before Magistrate Atkinson at Cobalt last week, Leo and Hector Boissonault, two brothers from Timmins, pleaded guilty to holding up a Chinaman at Elk Lake, and the lads, one around 23 and the other about four years younger, were sentenced to not less than six months nor more than two years less one day at Burwash. The younger lad, Hector, was out on parole from Burwash where he had been committed a year or so ago as one of several lads connected with a series of some twenty robberies in town. It is understood that the young man made a visit to Timmins after getting out on parole, but did not stay here nor did he report to the local police. Instead, he and the brother searched for work at Kirkland Lake and Elk Lake but apparently were not successful in securing employment. At Elk Lake they had a meal at Charlie Gip's restaurant, later returning to the Chinaman's place and holding up Yip at the point of a revolver. Hector is credited by the police with holding the revolver, while Leo's assistance was in the way of pulling down the blinds so that the affair could not be seen from the street. Something around \$50.00 was secured from the hold-up, the young men then walking to Earlton, from which place they took train to Cobalt. Word of the hold-up, however, had travelled ahead of them, and they were arrested at a Cobalt hotel. Some of the money had been spent, but the larger part of it was recovered. The young fellows had been travelling under the name of O'Brien, and when first arrested, maintained this to be their name, but later admitted their real identity.

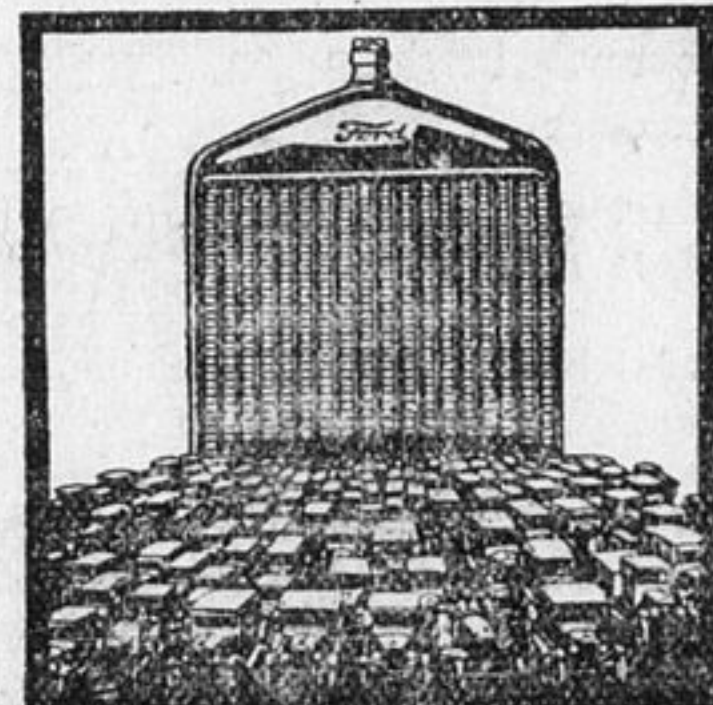
