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**DOME PRODUCTION OVER \$1,000,000 FIRST QUARTER**

Outlook Good, Says General Manager at Annual Meeting. More Exploration Work to be Done.

At the annual meeting of the Dome Mines last week, one of the particularly interesting features was the report of the General Manager, Mr. H. P. DePencier. In the course of his report Mr. DePencier stated that in the past quarter the mine had produced over \$1,000,000. Development work had met with a fair amount of success, but nothing very startling had been found, as he expected. The most interesting development had been the indications of ore in the Keewatin-Greenstone, lying south of the property on the 12th and 11th levels. Crosscuts on these levels had not yet intersected the ore body, but they were in carbonaceous formation and he thought they were not far from the ore. A complicated situation had been disclosed, which could not as yet be co-related with the drill cores. In the course of this work they had run into ore on the 11th level, east of the sediments, running around \$9, and were still in it. Nothing had yet been cut on the 12th level in this work. Ore was being opened elsewhere, but none of exceptional interest.

Looking to the future, Mr. DePencier said they anticipated deepening the shaft as ore had been found in drill holes below the 14th level. They couldn't do the work they wished at the 14th level until the shaft was deepened to the 14th level, at which development work would be done.

Ore had been encountered on the 13th level, which ran \$16 over thirty feet in width in the main crosscut, which, however, would probably only mill around \$11 account dilution. To the east again some 25 feet of eleven dollar ore had been struck. On this level there were indications of ore in new porphyry ground, ore never encountered before. Some spotty ore had been found in Dome Extension on the 12th level.

Last year had made a high point in production, he said. This year might not be quite so high, but would be a fair average at all events. It depended on the development of new richer ore. "Dome, however, has surprised us so often in the past that we live in hopes," he said.

Mr. DePencier said he was a great believer in exploration work and the mine must do more. During the year some 180 prospects had been examined but none taken up. Options were still held on some, but more work was needed on them. Any corporation which produced \$1,000,000 a quarter would naturally need a large ore body to interest them. He fully intended to keep on outside development and would have over half a dozen men out this summer. Competition for prospects would be keen as there were at least one hundred outfits looking for properties in Northern Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba.

Discussing the Dome itself, he said between the tenth and eleventh levels the greenstones had pushed out into the sediments, but were receding again at the 13th and 14th levels to the north. Further east there was a complicated porphyry situation. At the west end of the property he knew nothing at depth. Further east there were two porphyry bodies inclined at different angles and between porphyry stringers they were seeking ore in the greenstone. It looked favorable ground. Further east he expected to leave the carbonate area and encounter silicified greenstones where he thought ore might be.

When the sediments were bottomed they would have to look for the ore-bearing fractures which would be a big task.

The complicated structure between the two porphyry bodies he reiterated was favorable, possibly not unlike McIntyre formation. Two holes had shown economic values, but they

would have to be cut into before anything definite could be said.

**YOUNGSTER DIES FROM DRINKING WINTERGREEN**

The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—"The little child of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Guppy, of Temagami, aged one year and six months, passed away at the Lady Minto Hospital on Monday the 7th. The little one had the day before found a bottle of oil of wintergreen and evidently swallowed some of the contents. For several hours the parents did not know this was the cause of the baby's illness. They tried all remedies, as a doctor could not be had immediately and as soon as possible brought the child to the Lady Minto Hospital. Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon at Thorpe Bros.' Chapel, New Liskeard, interment taking place at New Liskeard cemetery. Everyone sympathizes with the bereaved ones."

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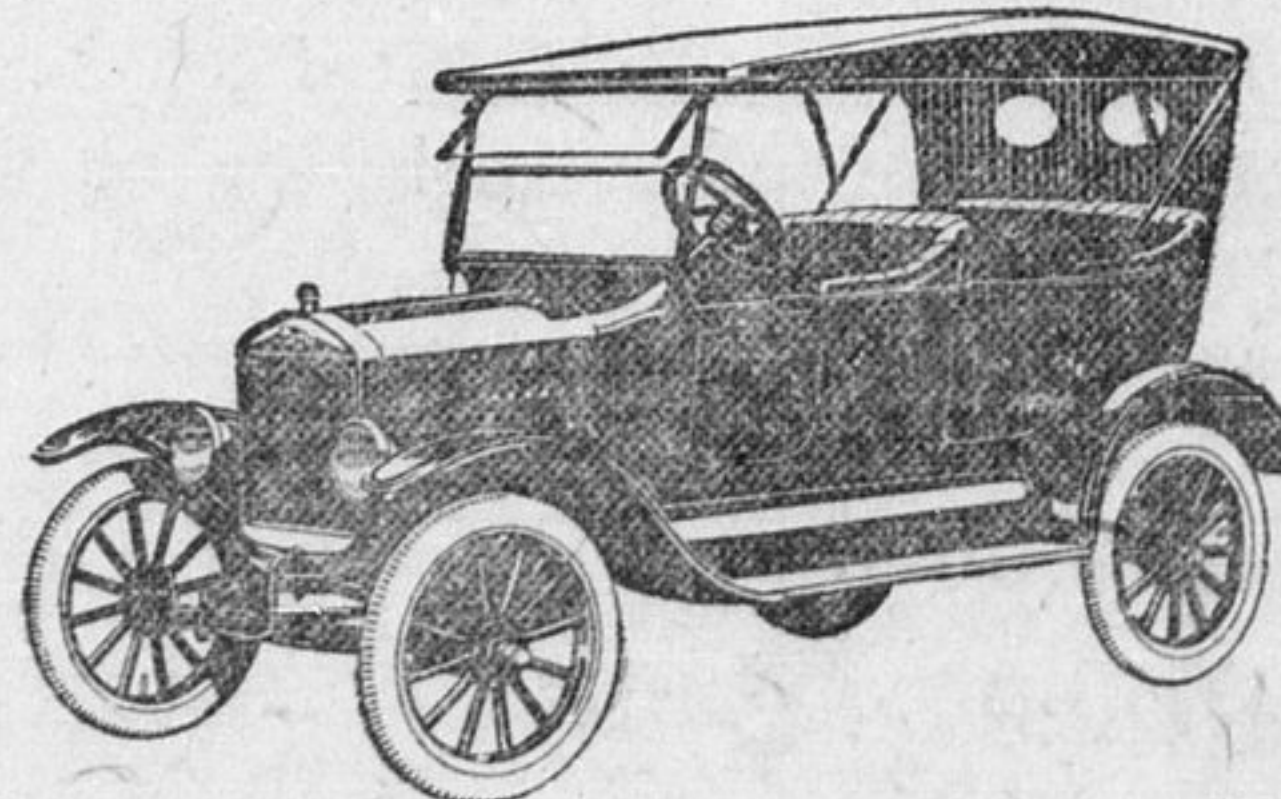
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
