Mr. R. T. Sandow, of Niagara Falls, N.Y., was a visitor to the Camp last week.

The Toner Gold Mining Co. intend to start an extensive diamond drilling campaign on their property on May 1st.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Anderson, of Winnipeg, were Timmins visitors last week.

Mr. L. M. Gross, of New York, President of the Canadel Gold Mines, Limited, was a visitor to Timmins last week and made an inspection of the company's properties in the immediate vicinity. It is understood that an extensive diamond drilling campaign is planned for this year.
