The lots are being cleared to allow the construction of the big new theatre for Timmins.

### SEVEN ARRESTS IN HOUSE IN GILLIES TOWNSITE

Constable Martin Has Coat Nearly Torn of Him. Liquor and Other Things Found in House.

Monday evening about 6:30 the Town Police had a hurry call to Gillies Lake Townsite just outside the Town limits. The information given the police was to the effect that a desperate row was in progress at the residence of John Seneuk and that it appeared as if the affair might wind up in a fatality unless it was stopped. In any event the noise was alarming the whole district. The place in question is outside the limits of the Town, but eventually in response to the urgent request for police attention, Officers D. Martin and W. Orr were sent out. They found evidences of drunkenness and a row and placed Seneuk under arrest. Taking him out of the house, Officer Martin had to drop back as the doorway was narrow, and some of the occupants of the house took the opportunity to slam the door shut with the one police officer outside with his prisoner and the other inside alone with one woman and five men. Constable Martin was set upon apparently from all sides and he had a stormy time. One man smashed him over the head with a billet of wood. Others hung on to him, tearing his coat nearly off his back. He was able to make his way out eventually, however, and assisted in seeing Seneuk safely locked away. Monday evening while the School Board was in session, Mrs. Seneuk visited the Town Hall and created such a disturbance that she had to be locked up. She did not desire to go below and the police had literally to carry her to the padded cell where she made the air hideous with her denunciation of the police and everything. Tuesday, with Constable W. Bennett, of Schumacher, the Town Police visited the Seneuk place in Gillies Lake Townsite and five men were arrested there including the man accused of smashing Constable Martin on the head. The police seized a quantity of liquor, etc., and a number of serious charges will result from the raid. The charges will include breaches of the Ontario Temperance Act, obstructing the police and assault. There have been several complaints about the place in the past, and the police intend to clear up the situation now.

### CHARGES OF BREACH O.T.A. AND OBSTRUCTING POLICE

As a result of a police raid on the place of J. D. McMaster, rear of Cedar street, there will be charges of breaches of the O.T.A. and of obstructing the police, heard before Magistrate Atkinson to-morrow. Visiting the house one evening recently the police found J. McDonald in the act of taking a drink. McMaster said he was the owner of the place and resented the police enquiries. A search of the premises resulted in the finding of literally hundreds of bottles that from their smell had once held liquor. The police say that there being four men paying room rent the place is a public place under the Act.

### HALF A DOZEN EASTER BUNS GATHERED UP LAST WEEK

Before the end of last week the Town Police had a nice collection of cases started for this week's court. Around Easter there were several that had acquired "buns" and before the week was out there were a half a dozen of these "Easter buns" collected in the town coop. They will answer to-morrow before Magistrate Atkinson for drinking not wisely but too well. Bill Klimovich faces the charge of keeping liquor for sale. The police raided Bill's place and carried off part of his kitchen. Under the window they found a strip of wainscoting that came away just as soon as you pulled out the ingenious window ledge that looked so innocent. The rig-up made a dandy cache, and there were two bottles of booze in the hiding place when the police discovered it. They brought Bill, the bottles, the window ledge and the loose sheeting along to the jail. Later Bill was allowed out on \$500.00 bail. Mrs. Geneneffe Rossi is another who will be charged with keeping for sale. There is a similar charge also preferred against J. Engstrom. There are four local drivers of delivery horses summoned for breach of the law in not having weights to hold their horses when left standing. Other drivers should make a note of these four cases and save themselves from a similar fate. The by-law requires the use of weights on delivery horses left standing on street, and Chief Greer and his staff are seeing that this by-law is observed.
