### BODY FOUND IN ISLAND FALLS RIVER LAST WEEK

The body of an unknown man was found in the river at Island Falls on Friday last about noon. An inquest was decided upon and the coroner went up on Saturday from Cochrane to Island Falls, the end of steel on the new extension of the T. & N.O. north of Cochrane. As soon as the news reached outside points in regard to the finding of the body, someone was, of course, ready to suggest that the dead man was Pashtan, the Russian sought on the charge of murdering Joe LaSilli at Island Falls some weeks ago. The description given of the dead man does not, however, tally at all with that of Pashtan, from the accounts coming down from Island Falls.

### ONLY SOME COBALT STORES OBSERVING HALF-HOLIDAY

The following is from the last issue of The Northern News of Cobalt:—"While it seems unlikely that Wednesday afternoon will be observed as a general half-holiday at the different stores in town this year some of the merchants will close as usual for part of that day during the summer months. Notices have been posted by the grocers that their stores will not be open for business after dinner on Wednesday, and the bank followed suit, this arrangement going into effect this week. In other stores it is stated that the proprietors will give their clerks an afternoon off each week although the stores will be open. The matter was mentioned casually at the Town Council, where it was stated by one member that no action could be taken by the town unless a certain proportion of the merchants of one particular business presented a petition asking for municipal action."

### PERMANENT ROADWAY FOR MAIN STREETS FAVOURED

(Continued from Page One)

Councillor Drew referred to the yearly loss suffered by merchants through the dust nuisance. He favoured the project.

Messrs. King and Reed both urged that conditions this year argued that the work would be done cheaper than likely later.

Eventually, on the motion of Messrs. Longmore and Wallingford the Council passed a resolution favouring the work, provided it did not interfere with other necessary expenditures, including waterworks and sewers extensions and roads necessary for fire protection.

Mr. King thought the resolution might delay matters by the suggested conditions, but Councillor Longmore said that the Town would be ready to go ahead as soon as the Bank agreed on advancing the money. The first of the bonds would not be payable until next year.

Mr. Armstrong presented a petition asking for the licensing of electrical workers to protect the public and the tax-payers in the business. This will be taken up at next meeting.

A petition was also presented asking for the opening up of Cedar street through the ball grounds. This was laid over.

There was a further brief discussion on amendments to the fire by-law with the question left over to next meeting. In the discussion it developed that the necessary amendment had not yet been passed for the erection of all-steel garages.

The proposal of Chairman Drew of the Fire & Light Committee to purchase a Seagraves combination hose and chemical motor truck from Sarnia roused the oft-repeated discussion of the feasibility of motor equipment here. The proposed truck could be bought for \$3500.00. It had been displaced by one with a pumper attached. Councillor Drew pointed out it would take the place of two teams and a chemical truck. A motion to have the truck examined with a view to purchase was lost. Councillors Longmore, Wallingford and Drew voted in favour and Councillors Bacon and Charlebois against. The Mayor voted against, making it a tie and declaring the motion lost.

A motion for the immediate purchase of an additional fire team and a horse-drawn chemical truck was carried. The additions to the fire hall will be proceeded with at once.

The Solicitor is to be asked to draft a by-law to compel all boarding houses and hotels to connect with the sewers. The Mayor called the attention of the Fire Chief to the danger of the lumber piled on the street at Gagne's planing mill in town.

With Councillors Longmore and Bacon against, a motion was passed to pay the Financial Post \$350.00 for a page advt. in the special issue to be sent to the Empire Exhibition in England.

It was a long session of Council, with considerable discussion on many of the topics, but nothing very new or startling.

### FORMER MANAGER OF CURTIS OPTICAL CO. PASSES AWAY

Many friends here heard with the deepest regret of the death last week of Mr. Krabbing, until recently manager of the Timmins branch of the Curtis Optical Co. Mr. Krabbing died from heart trouble. Some months ago he left Timmins to take specialists' treatment for valvular heart trouble. At the Baptist church Sunday evening, Rev. R. Hall referred with deep feeling to Mr. Krabbing's high character and attractive disposition and his many pleasing characteristics as an outstanding Christian and a gentleman.

### W. ROXBOROUGH SERIOUSLY INJURED AT MCINTYRE MINE

The condition of W. Roxborough, the young man injured at the McIntyre Mine last Thursday morning by being crushed by an ore car, shows little improvement. He is at the St. Mary's Hospital here and despite all that care and attention can do his recovery is not assured. A specialist from Toronto was brought here in the hopes of benefitting the young man's chances of recovery. The young fellow is around 19 years of age and lives with his mother and sisters at Timmins. He was prominent and very popular in Junior Football last year and regret at his injuries are very general and wishes sincere for his recovery. He is injured around the spine and also is thought to be suffering from internal injuries.

### CONS. WEST DOME LAKE MILL TO BE GOING THIS SUMMER

Advices reaching the Camp last week from Toronto is to the effect that the underwriters have taken up the balance of the 40-cent stock of the Consolidated West Dome Lake, and that there is every reason to believe the remainder will be taken up at the underwriting price of 45 cents. Information gathered in New Liskeard, where nearly a million shares of Consolidated West Dome Lake is held by the Hudson Bay Mining Company, and with large individual blocks by Hudson Bay officials, is that the directors of Consolidated West Dome Lake are of opinion that the funds in sight will be sufficient to carry the enterprise to the point where milling operations will place the mine on a self-sustaining basis. It is the aim of the management to place the mill in operation by late summer.
