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

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SUMMER PLOUGHING BEST FOR NORTHEBN ONTARIO

Early August a Good Time Says Mr. J. P. S. Ballantyne of Kapuskasing Experimental Farm.

Writing last week to The Advance Mr. J. P. S. Ballantyne, Superintendnt of the Experimental Station at Kapuskasing, Ont., says:-

Good ploughing done at the proper time is one of the main essentials in producing maximum crops. It has been demonstrated that summer ploughing in Northern Ontario has a more beneficial effect on crops the following year than late fall or early spring ploughing, especially when a clover sod or legumes of any kind are turned under for building up the fertility of the soil. The main reason, for this is that the sod has a chance to decay and plant food is readily available when the seed is sown the following year. Early August is a good time to plough, just after the haying season. If the land can be given a disking then it will be found well worth while, because spring seeding time is short in Northern Ontario. and if most of the necessary preparatory work on the seed bed is done the year before the chances for a good crop are improved.

Summer ploughing on virgin soil at this Station has given such excellent results in erop production, that every settler who has a few acres to break up this year will be well advised to make every effort to summer-plough the land and compare the results with late fall or early spring ploughing. It seems certain that a much larger area will be thus treated in future years in this district, as climatic conditions are such that the soil must be in proper shape for seeding as soon as spring opens. If ploughing has te be done in the spring, the seeding will be late, yields poor, and the charces for maturing grain lessened.

Although in poor health since last fall her last illness was only of two weeks' duration and her passing was a great shock to her family and friends.



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
