**MR. T. S. CLARK PASSES AWAY  
ON VISIT TO SCOTLAND**

There will be very general and deep sorrow throughout the Camp at the sad news reaching this week of the death of Mr. T. S. Clark, for several years a frequent visitor to Timmins and district. The news reaching here is very brief and lacking in detail. Mr. Clark was on a visit to the beloved land of his forefathers—Scotland. Following a motor trip, he caught cold and the cold was succeeded by pneumonia, from which illness he passed away.

The late T. S. Clark was a Chartered Accountant of very high standing. His home was in Toronto but he made frequent visits to Timmins, being the auditor for the Hollinger Mine, the Hollinger Stores and other big business concerns in the Camp. While he was rated very high in his profession, he was given equally high rating as a man by all who knew him. During his frequent visits here he showed great interest in the Caledonian Society and his wise and witty addresses his topical poems, and his general geniality won him hosts of friends. His original and talented addresses at the annual Burns Banquets here will be long remembered. One of his epigrams is specially worth preserving. "I believe," he said once, "that a Scotsman loves an argument as much as an Irishman loves a fight."

The late T. S. Clark was 69 years of age at the time of his death, and his life was a busy, a useful and an exemplary one. Well-read, keenly intelligent, shrewd, humorous, kindly and friendly, many in Timmins who had occasion to know Mr. Clark will deeply regret his death, and sincerely sympathize with those near and dear who particularly mourn the passing of a gentleman in the highest sense of the word.

**LARGE CLAIMS FOR DAMAGES  
AT NEW LISKEARD COURT**

One of the most important cases of its kind coming before a North Land court is scheduled for Thursday of this week at the non-jury sittings of the Supreme Court at New Liskeard, with Mr. Justice Mowat presiding. The St. Maurice Lumber Co. is the plaintiff and asks for \$75,765.07, with an additional \$8,052.30. The defendants, the Porcupine Pulp & Lumber Co. have entered a counter claim for \$80,452.89. The suit arises over pulpwood cut four years ago together with the alleged blocking of the Porcupine River so that plaintiff's logs were held up for twelve months, it is claimed with consequent loss in price through the falling market. In the counter-claim, the Porcupine Pulp & Lumber Co. claims for excess cost of purchased wood, overhead charges, labour loss, loss in price on sale of pulpwood, etc. In the statement of defence the Porcupine Pulp Co. says that the plaintiff's drive was not delayed through any fault of defendants and that the plaintiff blocked the river and prevented the defendants from reaching Hoyle.
