**ALL SHOULD BE CAREFUL  
IN REGARD TO CANOES**

The Advance has been asked to call attention to a serious danger encountered on several recent occasions by canoeists on the river here. This danger arises from the improper attitude of some of those running gasoline launches and other power boats. Sometimes these large power boats deliberately approach canoes simply for the perverted amusement of seeing the canoeists become excited and attempt to escape from danger. On a recent occasion, it is said, a canoe attempted to get away from one of these larger boats but in a frame of misguided humor the bigger boat deliberately followed until the canoe was almost to the shore, the occupants of the larger boat taking much apparent fun out of the evident agitation of the canoeists. The slightest thought in the matter should show anyone that it is criminal folly to attempt any sort of humor in regard to a canoe. Many of those using canoes here are unable to swim; some are only poorly skilled in the art of canoe work; and it should never be forgotten that a canoe is not designed for careless usage. It is very easy to upset a canoe, with fatal results. It may be taken for granted that no one would wish to cause an accident likely to result in loss of life, so no doubt the simple mention of the matter will be sufficient to stop the foolish practice of endangering canoeists in a mistaken idea of fun. It is no joke to endanger life. All using the river should make it a first article of their daily creed to do all possible to avoid danger for others and for themselves.

**MR. JAS. MCGREGOR PASSES  
AWAY AT HIS POST OF DUTY**

Thursday morning last Mr. Jas. McGregor, gateman at the Hollinger Mine, was found dead in his chair at his post of duty. He had passed away quietly while waiting for the next shift that would relieve him of his duties for the time. The late James McGregor was 78 years of age on his last birthday, and for ten years he had been gateman at the Hollinger, in that decade only losing a total of five shifts. Practically everyone knew him and he was very highly regarded by all. Quiet but friendly, never impatient, never with an ill-word for anyone, and always faithful to his duty, the late Mr. McGregor made innumerable friends during his service in Timmins and regret is very general at his death. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1846, and came to Canada when only a few weeks old. His mother died on the voyage, and was buried at sea. The baby boy was taken to relatives at Ottawa where he was brought up and lived until young manhood.

In addition to the bereaved widow, one son, Percy, resides in Timmins. Another son, Gordon, as at present in far-off China. To these and to the other near relatives and friends, and especially to the sorrowing widow who holds the respect of all who know her, the sincere sympathy of all will be extended.

The funeral took place Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock to Timmins cemetery, from the family residence, 106 Birch street. Services were conducted at the house by Rev. J. D. Parks, pastor of the Timmins Presbyterian church. Many friends paid their last marks of respect to the deceased and the floral tokens were many and beautiful.

**TOWN BLUE AND AMBER WIN  
FROM MCINTYRE TEAM**

Crowd Not Large at Football Double Header Saturday, but Games Specially Interesting.

The Town Blue and Amber Football Team gained two points from the McIntyre team on Saturday last by a score of 2 to 1 in the P.D.F.L. series. There were a few changes in the Town line-up. G. Ritchie went on the forward line and Marsland at right half and strengthened the team considerably. Ritchie worked hard and the Town should have had more goals off his passes. Marsland cleared in great style. Andy Roberts worked hard and with his usual effectiveness and skill and with Berry the Town team had a fine pair of good backs. The Town pressed after a journey by the McIntyres. Jones clearing to Cooper who sent his forwards away. Neely got the ball and cleared, but the leather soon came back. Atkinson worked his way through and passed. Ritchie received but kicked wide. Cadman got the ball from the goal kick and sent it down to Adamson who beat the backs but hit the upright with his shot. Johnson cleared the rebound and set Wallace going. After a speedy run Wallace sent the ball across. Robson caught the flying ball and sent it past Larimer for a goal. The Town then got some extra pep in the match and soon had the McIntyres penned in their own quarters. After five minutes of this the Town were awarded a penalty for hands. Ritchie took the spot kick and scored. The McIntyres pressed hard to regain their lead. Cockburn on the right sent over a neat pass only to have Roberts clear. Time and again they tried to get through with combination but were checked up by the Town halves, while Hoeken on the other hand pulled off some nice saves. The change-over was made with no further score.

The second half started with Cooper off the field from injuries received near half-time, but came on again in ten minutes. The McIntyres were the first to press. Larimer saved a hot shot from Scottie's nice pass. The ball was transferred to the other end and after a nice shot and a good save by Hoeken, Cooper sent the ball in before the goalie could recover. The McIntyres again pressed but their combination was being broken up repeatedly. Berry cleared a dangerous one from the left and sent his forwards away again, but the opposing backs put in some good work. Both teams were working hard but failed to alter the score. Full time score was 2 to 1 in favour of the Town.
