WOMAN SUICIDES AFTER HUSBAND IS MURDERED

religious book in the Roumanian language that the woman had been noticed as spending much time in reading on Thursday. A marriage license was also found. It is probable that the couple believed this to be a marriage certificate. It was dated over two years ago, May, 1922, and issued to Mike Lasuck and Nastasiz Badialuck. The fact that the couple still had the license would suggest that they had considered this document all that was necessary.

Lasuck had been working at Boston Creek and was up here on a visit. He was last seen alive on Wednesday night, being intoxicated at that time.

Neighbors say that the couple had frequent quarrels and that there was much drinking going on at the place, the house being suspected as a blind pig as well. The police think that Lasuck in a drunken state lay down on the floor to sleep, and that the woman used on him one of the axes found in the house. His skull was smashed in at one place and there were eight cuts and slashes on his head. The fracture likely caused death, the fact that there was little blood on the floor or underclothing supporting the theory that the cuts were inflicted after the man was knocked insensible. The use of the coal oil and candle were no doubt designed to burn up the evidences of the crime. The woman had apparently stayed alone for eighteen or twenty hours with the dead body in the house.

On Friday morning the body of the woman, Nastasiz Badialuck, was found floating on the river near McChesney's mill. There was practically no water in the lungs, and death had been due to the drop from the bridge or to shock. The woman's breast was badly bruised where she had struck the water.

An inquest was opened on Saturday afternoon into the death of Lasuck,

Coroner Montgomery presiding, and Mr. T. F. King being the foreman of the jury. The evidence given added little to the information secured by the police. The jury, however, were interested in references made by some witnesses to a big party in the house Wednesday night and also in regard to an automobile that had parked before the place for long periods of time in the day or two near the crime.

To secure further witnesses that might throw further light on these features, the jury suggested an adjournment, and Coroner Montgomery set the adjourned inquest to be held Thursday afternoon of this week.
