Recently, the Society overcame this handicap by the purchase from Mr. R. Leheup of the building on Browning street, Haileybury, known as The Lodge and recently used as an inn. The building will be a very suitable one for the purpose desired and will be opened for use as soon as it can be furnished and equipped and a matron secured. The Porcupine District appreciates the handicap to the C.A.S. work through the need of a shelter and all here will be pleased indeed to know that Haileybury and district centres have found a way out of the difficulty and will soon have a good Shelter in operation once more. Perhaps, the Porcupine District may follow the good example of the southern part of the district and facilitate the C.A.S. work here by the establishment of a Shelter where youngsters may be housed and cared for until proper homes are secured for them. The Haileybury Shelter was destroyed in the fire of October, 1922.

**NORTH BAY BUSINESS MEN
PLAN TOUR OF NORTH LAND**

North Bay business men are planning a tour of the North Land this summer and may be joined in the trip by a party of Sudbury business men. In connection with the matter, the North Bay Nugget last week had the following front page reference:—

"A plan is under way to have a trade excursion of North Bay business men to the towns of Northern Ontario, under the auspices of the Board of Trade. The plan was broached at the meeting of the council of the board at noon today and met with approval and will now be submitted to the members."

"The proposed itinerary was submitted and calls for visits to all the towns between here and Cochrane. It is possible that the Sudbury board will be invited to participate in this excursion. The suggested date is late in August or early in September."

"There will also be another excursion this summer under the auspices of the Board of Trade but it will be more in a social way. This is to be a Wednesday afternoon picnic to the French River. No date has yet been set."
