back memories of the war period to the present generation. The braves could deck themselves out in corduroy trousers for two dollars and could add a vest for a similar outlay. If they bought ribbons for the squaws at home they were called upon to expend twelve cents a yard for this article of adornment. Three point blankets cost two dollars and a half. A man's calico shirt was valued at a dollar and a half and a scalping knife could be secured for twelve cents. Soap cost fifty cents a pound. One ivory comb was priced at a quarter and the price for fine blue cloth was two dollars a yard. A bag of corn was entered at about four dollars. For two days' labor a youth was

credited with seventy-five cents. "The entries are all in shillings, and, for purposes of comparison, the prices have been calculated at approximately twenty-five cents to the shilling."

ADVANTAGES OF HAILEYBURY AS BASE FOR AIR SERVICE

"Arrangements have been practically completed for the establishment of a base at Haileybury for the machines of the Laurentide Air Serrice, operating between the Ronyn goldfields and outside points," says 💈 the Haileyburian last week. Continging a review of the matter The Haileyburian says:-

"For some time it has been evident that to properly take care of the traffic to and from the new camp, a & more suitable base than Angliers 2 should be provided for the airplanes. As a large majority of the passengers who take this method of making a quick trip to or from their mining properties find Haileybury the most convenient starting point, and much of the freight handled originates from points in Ontario, it has been decided that the base will be established here: At no point on Lake Temiskaming or any other lake in the immediate district is there to be found such a suitable location for the purpose. There is ample water space for the machines to alight and take off and the wharfage facilities are of the best. All these points have been taken into consideration by the company. It is proposed to build a landing stage to make it more convenient for handling passengers, and the company will be given the use of the winter market for an office. Mr. Wilshire, managing director of the Laurentide Air Service was in Haileybury this week and met members of the town council and the board of trade, with the result that a decision was arrived at to establish the base here.


