**MANY BEAUTIFUL WILD
FLOWERS IN THE DISTRICT**

Last year Mr. A. Anson brought to The Advance Office a sample of an odd plant that he found while on a prospecting trip. Two lady readers of The Advance recognized the plant, from the description given, as belonging to the Pitcher Plant family and being of the species "Sarracenia." One of the ladies later brought in further and better specimens of the Sarracenia and gave interesting details as to the history and character of the plant. While the Sarracenia was attractive enough in appearance, its chief interest lay in the fact that it was of the insectivorous type of plants. In other words, it might be termed a "fly catcher." It has cup like leaves that open and contract and prove often the death chamber for insects, the plant drawing nourishment from the bodies of the little creatures so caught in the natural traps.

A few days ago the same lady, who takes a deep interest in botanical matters, was kind enough to favour The Advance with further specimens of the Sarracenia, this time in the glory of their summer beauty. The plants have a tropical type of beauty, with striking coloring, the leaves shading from dark, deep red to a delicate pale green. The specimens were found north of the Whelpdale property, in the swampy section of ground there. There, also, was found a handsome specimen of the orchid family.

Those who think this North Land but a waste of snow and ice in winter and a breeding ground for mosquitos and black flies in summer, should take a jaunt out through the nearby wooded sections, and see the profusion of flowers, native to the land, and growing wild in the bush and by the river banks. The river banks are fragrant with wild roses, tinted white, pink and red. There are buttercups, daisies small and large, tiger lilies of startling beauty, wild iris, and other beautiful flowers and plants. And clover in all its charm will be met with very frequently. Nature shows a charming face in the woods and on the river banks of the North Land in summer time.

**FARMERS' DAY AT FALLS
AGAIN PROVES SUCCESS**

250 Farmers and Settlers Present
from Around the District. Market
Train to be Put on
to Falls.

Last Wednesday was Farmers' Day at Iroquois Falls and proved even more successful than last year. From all over the nearby district, Shillington, Matheson, Monteith, Val Gagne, Porquis Junction, and along the Porcupine branch parties motored in and came by train to the Falls for the big day. There were fully 250 farmers and settlers in attendance. There was considerable discussion on various problems of interest and very general regret expressed that there was no representative present as expected from the Dept. of Lands and Forests, as the road problem was particularly prominent and there was general anxiety to give the Dept. of Lands and Forests the settler's viewpoint in this matter.

Chairman Geo. W. Lee and Commissioners Martin and McLaren of the T. & N.O. were among those present. Emphasis was given to the need for a special market produce train to Iroquois Falls. Chairman Lee promised such a train would be run from Swastika with a single fare rate for the return trip. "The train is to run on the distinct understanding that unless it is patronized by the farmers it will be cancelled." Mr. W. H. Alderson, ex-President of the Toronto Board of Trade, and Mr. T. F. King, President of Timmins Board of Trade, were among the other speakers. Mr. Alderson's eloquent address was very enthusiastically received. Mr. King spoke of the great need for roads and the disadvantage to the country from being so far from the seat of government. A complaint having been made that settlers in the Shillington area had been paid \$5.50 per cord for pulpwood while the Abitibi Co. was paying \$6.50 elsewhere last season, brought the explanation that the Abitibi had tried to get settlers to sign contracts at \$6.50 but they would not sign and the Company had to look elsewhere for a supply. Jolbers had no doubt bought up pulpwood at the reduced rate referred to. This relieved the Company from any blame in the matter, but it was felt that it would be a good thing if the settlers and the Company could deal directly with each other. A committee was appointed to facilitate this.

In addition to the helpful discussions and addresses, the Abitibi Company and the Town of Iroquois Falls provided a most interesting programme for the visitors. This included a tour through the big paper mill, an amusing motion picture, baseball, races and other sports, novelties, etc. It was a big day and much appreciated by the settlers.

The addresses by Mr. Geo. W. Lee, Mr. R. A. McInnis, manager of the Abitibi Co., J. H. McDonald, Mayor of North Bay, and others were helpful and much appreciated. An attack on the T. & N.O. Ry. by one of those present roused a number of defenders including several who had special words of commendation for Chairman Lee and the present Commission and their good work for the North Land.

**N.O.F.A. CENSURES P.D.F.L.
FOR ATTITUDE TO REFEREE**

Last week the Northern Ontario Football Association held a meeting, the chief business being the appeal of the Dome club against the finding of the Porcupine District Football League in the matter of the Dome Black and White vs. Cornish One-and-All match on June 26th. There was extended discussion in the matter, eventually a resolution being moved by W. A. Field and seconded by B. C. Lamble to the effect that the decision of the P. D. F. L. as regards awarding game to the winners be sustained, but that the P.D.F.L. be censured for allowing cases against players to be dropped. The resolution also recommended that the referee concerned be reinstated. This resolution was eventually passed by a vote of 4 to 3. An amendment to have the game in question thrown out and re-played was defeated, 4 to 3. The resolution passed by the N.O.F.A. seems to be showing the proper support for the referees and other officials. 29

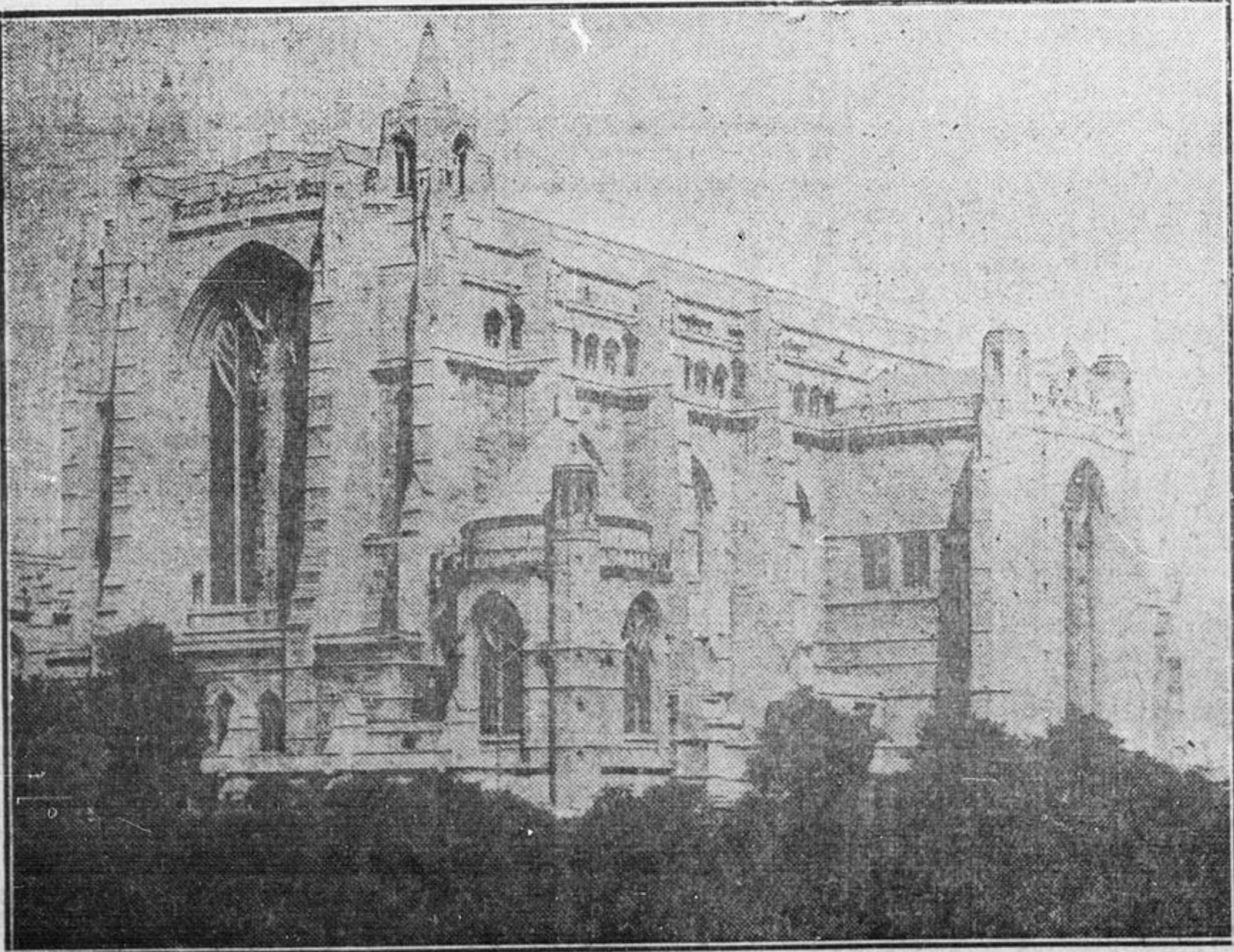

FIRST CATHEDRAL TO BE CONSECRATED IN SEVEN CENTURIES

Liverpool Cathedral, which when finished will dwarf Westminster Abbey and be second in size as a place of public worship only to St. Peter's of Rome, is to be consecrated in the presence of the King and Queen on July 16. The architect, Mr. G. Gilbert Scott, was only 20 years old when his plans were accepted over a score of years ago. This will be the first consecration of a Cathedral in England for more than 700 years, although sites have been consecrated during the period.
