ALL LUMBER MILLS MUST HAVE LICENSES IN ONTARIO

Legislation went into force on July 1st this year, making it compulsory for all lumber mills to take out a yearly license. This applies to all sawmills in the Province irrespective of size. Fees for the licenses range from \$1.00 to \$5.00 for the larger mills, the smaller mills being able to secure their licenses without any cost at all.

In explanation of the terms of the act, in addition to circularizing all listed sawmill owners, W. C. Cain. Deputy Minister of Lands and Forests, issued the following statement:

"With a view to a more effective method of keeping check upon the output of mills, ascertaining the source of supply and the general class and quality of timber used, the present government in its intensive effort toward conservation of the forest wealth has provided this machinery and the statistical results, when Gordon Block with valuable information.

"The act with its regulations requires each individual or company in Ontario manufacturing rough lumber, lath, shingles, sawn ties, veneer, cooperage stock, pulp or paper and mills engaged in cutting up, barking, or rossing pulpwood to secure an annual license from the Department of Lands and Forests and to furnish certain facts in respect of the source of supply and output. Penalties are provided for failure to comply with the requirements."

MAN CAUGHT IN FALLING TRENCH, BUT NOT HURT

Thursday afternoon last one of the workmen employed on the storm sewer work stepped on the edge of the trench at the corner of Pine street and Fourth Avenue and the earth gave underneath him. The sand and gravel came down with him as he fell into the trench and he was covered up past the knees by the falling earth and pinned right in the trench. He called loudly for help, and other workmen were on the scene immediately and in a few minutes he was dug out, without the slightest injury, except that he received a considerable fright when he found himself half buried. The incident and the man's shouts attracted a crowd of considerable size to the scene and when the speedy shovel work had released the man the crowd expressed its appreciation by a cheer or two. The workmen had been warned to keep away from the edges of the excavations, and now special precautions are being taken to prevent any further accidents. 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
