About 700 men have been thrown out of work at Sudbury through the closing down of the British American Nickel Corporation, the company having gone into liquidation.

Thursday last the Fire Brigade had a run to Mr. Tony DeLuca's residence, 60 Birch street south. The alarm came from some stovepipes catching fire. The fire was put out without any particular loss occurring.

The North Bay Board of Trade has extended a cordial invitation to the Sudbury Board to join with the North Bay organization in the proposed trade trip to Northern Ontario in September.

A bear was caught in a trap at the Beaver Mine, Cobalt, last week, and later sent to the happy hunting grounds by the gun route. The shooting of a bear or two more, and perhaps a little less shooting of the bull, might help the mining market.

Mr. George Nelson, of Kirkland Lake, and Miss Mabel Smith, of Matheson, were united in marriage recently, at Englehart. They will reside in Kirkland Lake, where Mr. Nelson has a business.

Porcupine Fair is making arrangements to have this year a new type of machine for the recording of the pulling power of horses. This machine is in use in other sections of the country. It records very closely and accurately the pulling power of a horse or team and it will add much to the interest of the contests along this line.
