HANDSOME GARRETT SHIELD ON DISPLAY THIS WEEK

The Garrett Shield has been on display for some days past and has attracted much attention and favourable comment. This large silver shield, suitably engraved, is mounted on a polished wood base and surrounded by eight smaller silver shields to bear the names of the winning teams each year. In an official note to The Advance, Mr. W. A. Field, Secretary-Treasurer of the Porcupine District Football League, says:—
"The J. E. Garrett Shield has been presented to the P.D.F.L. on the condition that it be played on points and goal average, the team winning shield the most number of years out of eight to become sole owners of same. During this period of 8 years, Mr. J. E. Garrett and Mr. W. A. Field, will be the trustees of shield, and to be the final court of appeal in event of any disputes arising as to the disposition of said shield. In the event of either gentlemen leaving this part of the country he shall, with the consent and approval of the other trustee, name a successor to take his place."

TIMMINS KIDS KID THE AUTHORITIES AT TORONTO

Toronto newspapers last week carried romantic stories of two Timmins lads who had run away from their widowed mother here and had been hitting the high spots in the Queen City. The Toronto police apparently were anxious to ship them back here and to this end asked the local police to arrange the necessary finances for this purpose. Instead the local authorities suggested the two lads be returned to the Industrial School from which they had apparently escaped, their stories about running away from home being slightly misleading, to put it kindly. Hardly had these boys been dealt with than word came of two other Timmins lads escaping from the Industrial School. The latter two had only reached Toronto a few days previously to start terms for incorrigible behaviour. The ages of the lads range from 12 to 14. They are now all safely back at the Industrial School and it is to be hoped that they will now be well looked-after at that institution.

BLAMES AUTOMOBILES FOR LOSS OF BUSINESS

Montreal—The increasing demand for luxuries is partly responsible for the present depression in business, according to E. Lapointe, Secretary of the Quebec Division of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, who has recently been investigating this question for members of the association.
"The great difficulty is that people, without means insist on maintaining and operating motor cars," declared Mr. Lapointe. "Members of our association, whose customers have not been purchasing as much as usual have, on making inquiry, found that automobiles, betting on race horses, high living, or some form of extravagance, have been taking the customer's money, with the result that the merchants suffer."
"We have learned that expenditures on automobiles alone amount to millions a week in this Province, and this is money that formerly went to the small merchants and into the banks."
Serious thought will be given to these matters at the Dominion convention, which opens in Ottawa on Aug. 18. Quebec was not alone with the gambling problem, but reports from various other parts of Canada, Toronto particularly indicated that the gambling problem constituted a distinct menace to business.

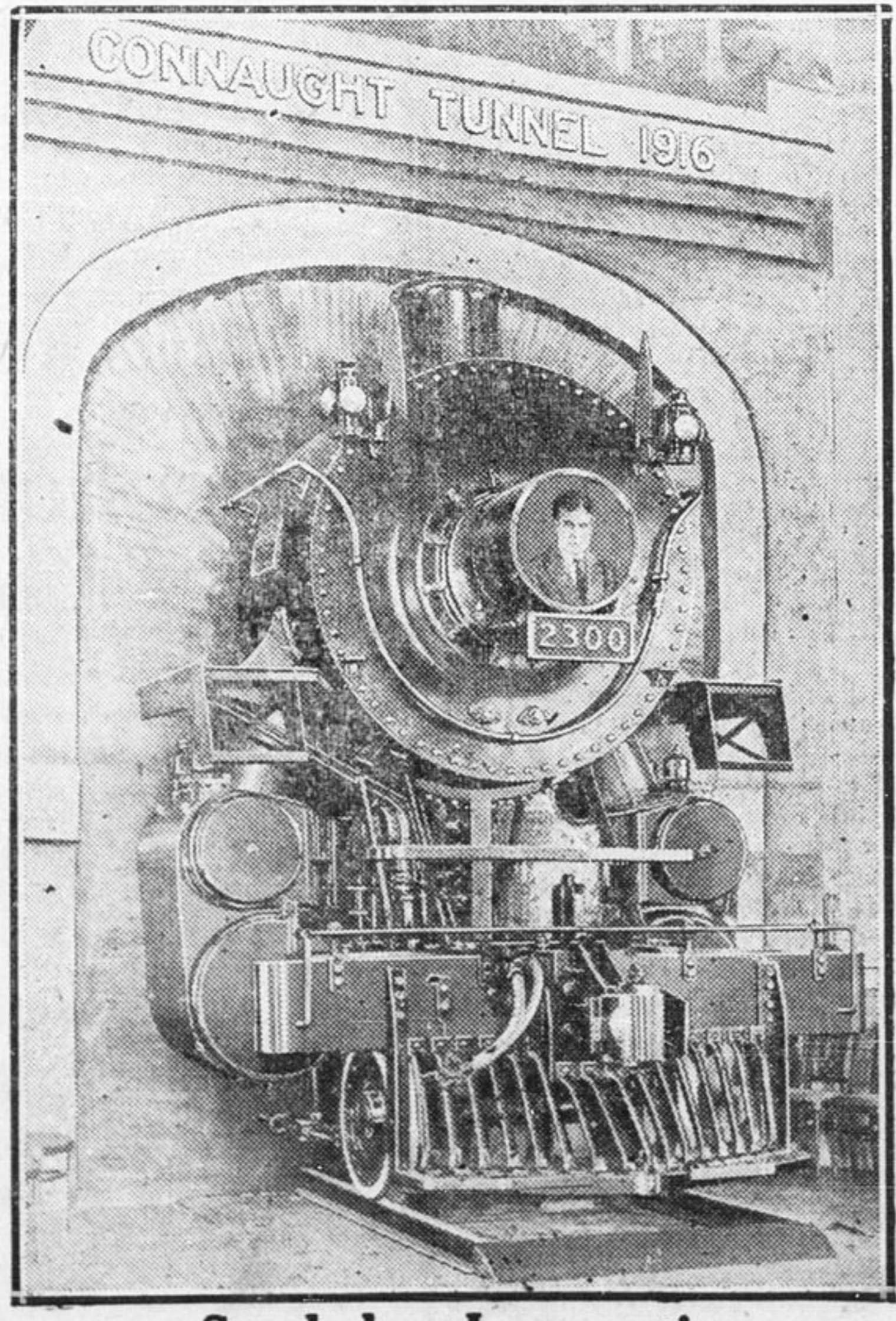
