MR. RANEY'S FRIENDS TO  
BLAME FOR CONDITIONS NOW

Winnipeg Reader Writes His Views  
on the Prohibition Question.

To the Editor of the Advance,  
Timmins, Ont.

Sir:—Mr. Raney has condemned Mr. Ferguson's decision to hold a referendum on the Ontario Temperance Act next October.

This is natural because no person who has upheld the principle of compulsory legislation is pleased to find that principle so widely discussed and criticised as it is now being discussed and criticised.

Mr. Raney made the statement the other day that the proposed plebiscite is an unnecessary expense. Certainly a referendum and all the work it involves is an expense.

It does, not, however, appear to occur to Mr. Raney or to any other upholder of the "dry" cause that all the heavy expenses to which Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta have already been put and to which Ontario will certainly be put might have been spared if a little more common sense had been used a few years ago when the liquor laws were first framed.

The many referenda, and all the heavy cost of futile attempts to enforce an unenforceable law would have been saved, to say nothing of the endless other more serious and lasting troubles which have been brought upon individuals, if only those who—with a flood of propaganda—persuaded people, in an abnormal time, to vote for a law which the most elementary common sense might have told them was totally inapplicable to normal times or to normal human beings.

DEATH OF MR. HUMPHREY SHERIDAN AT AGE OF 82

The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—

"On the 11th instant our old and esteemed friend, Humphrey Sheridan, passed away very suddenly at Parry Sound. On the previous Sunday he attended church with his wife and was making preparations for the parade on the 12th when he was called away. The deceased was born in the County of Cavan, Ireland, in 1842, and came to Canada when ten years of age in a sailing vessel which took seven weeks to make the trip. He became a member of the Orange Order in 1859, joining No. 4 Lodge, Toronto, and never missed a walk on the 12th of July until last year when although unable to march, he attended the hall as usual. He served in the Fenian raid in 1866 and received a gold medal which he prized very highly and also a farm in New Ontario. He is survived by his wife, three sons, Charles of Cobalt, George and Gilmore of Timmins and four daughters, Mrs. W. L. Rodgers, of Kingston; Mrs. Thos. J. Badger, of Parry Sound and Misses Bertha and Birdie, of Boston. The funeral was conducted by the L.O.L. and was largely attended by members from Hurdyville, McKellar and Carling. The pall bearers were Brothers Hyman, McCullough, Purvis, Campbell, Bushey and Stanley. Mr. Sheridan commenced shoemaking when 13 years of age and worked at the trade continuously until quite recently. He was always a staunch Conservative and a member of the Anglican church and very highly respected in the town and district."


