Some of the leaders may yet find themselves a resting place at the bottom. It is by no means settled yet as to who will be the proud possessor of the handsome Garrett Shield for this, the initial year, 1924.

"Joe Sarsfield, of the Mining Recorder's office at Haileybury, has gone to Tashota to reopen the office formerly established at that point. He left Haileybury last Friday en route for Port Arthur, where he was to secure the records for the office, which was to be open for business today. Some years ago an office was opened at Tashota for the Kow-kash Mining Division, but this was

closed during the war, and Mining Recorder Morgan was transferred to Elk Lake. Now it is reported that quite a boom is being experienced in that district and it has been decided by the Department at Toronto to reopen the office. Over 300 claims have been recorded this year to date, and it has been necessary for prospectors to go to Port Arthur to transact their business."
