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

SIMPLE RULES TO GUARD AGAINST FOREST FIRES

There are seven simple rules in relation to fire prevention that are worthy to be posted in every lumber camp, every national area, and in every forest where fire hazard exists in any form.

1. Be sure your match is out before throwing it away. Break it in two with your fingers.

2. Don't throw cigars, cigarettes or pipe ashes along the roadside. I you are riding, improvise an ash tray in your machine. A tin can will do. If you are walking, grind your stubs matches and ashes in the dirt.

3. Build small camp fires away from brush and small trees. Scrape away all leaf mold and other inflammable material around your fire.

4. Never leave your camp fire unwatched. A wind may spring up at any moment.
