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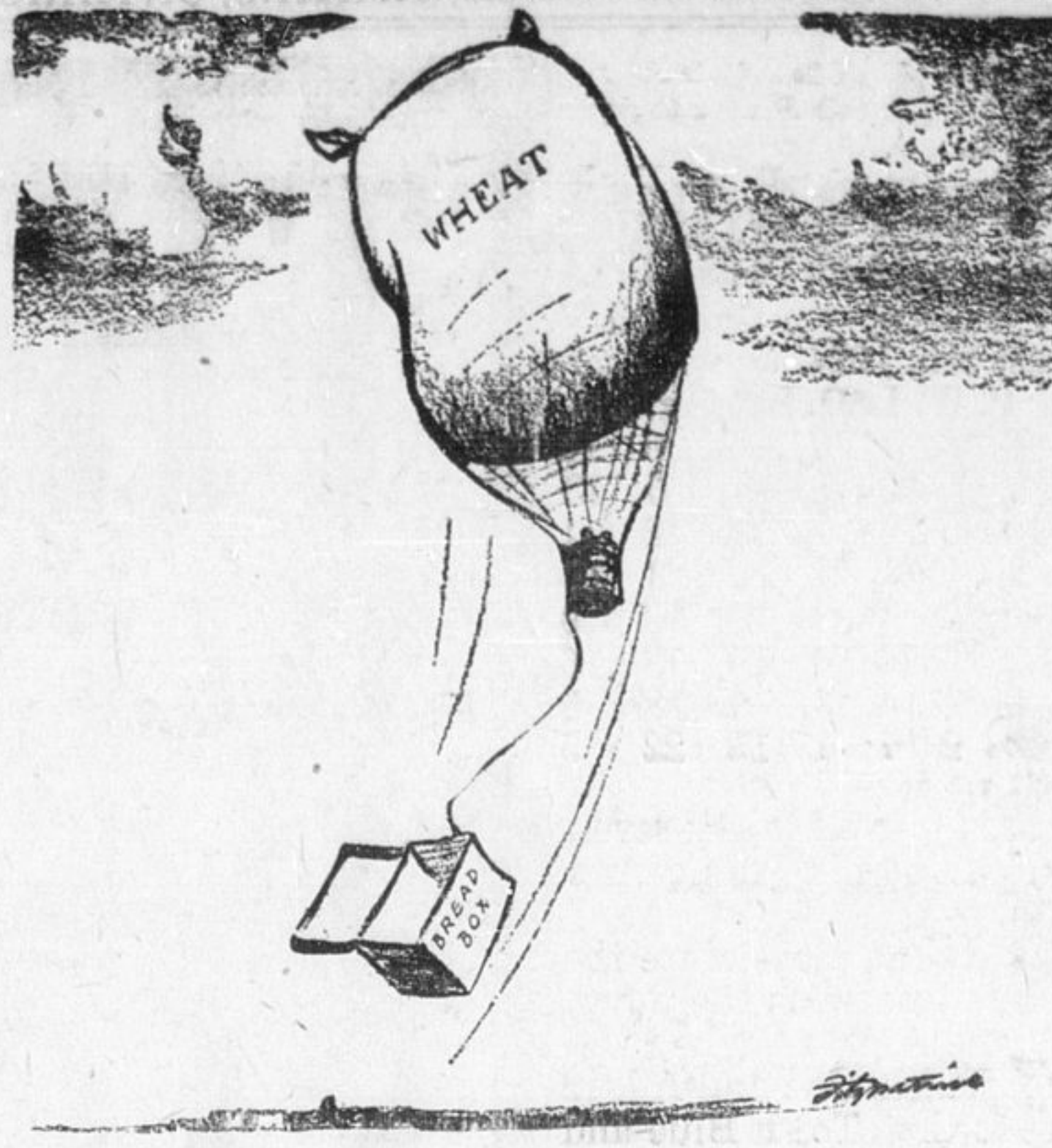

SIMPLE RULES TO GUARD AGAINST FOREST FIRES

There are seven simple rules in relation to fire prevention that are worthy to be posted in every lumber camp, every national area, and in every forest where fire hazard exists in any form.

1. Be sure your match is out before throwing it away. Break it in two with your fingers.
2. Don't throw cigars, cigarettes, or pipe ashes along the roadside. If you are riding, improvise an ash tray in your machine. A tin can will do. If you are walking, grind your stubs, matches and ashes in the dirt.
3. Build small camp fires away from brush and small trees. Scrape away all leaf mold and other inflammable material around your fire.
4. Never leave your camp fire unwatched. A wind may spring up at any moment.
5. Pour water on your camp fire when you are finished with it. Be sure it is dead—then bury it with dirt or gravel. Don't make the mistake of burying it with leaf mold or other inflammable material.
6. If in a wooded region keep in touch with the Forest Ranger or fire-warden. Report all fires you may see, however small. If you see a fire beginning to burn stop and fight it while some other member of your party gets word to the ranger or fire-warden.
7. Be as careful with fire while you are in wooded areas as you would be in your own home. Be thoughtful and reasonable at all times.—Pulp & Paper Magazine.

Singleton, for the Lancashires, had a nice chance to put them on even terms when he beat his way through, but his shot went high. Foy sent over a nice pass, but Dedrickson cleared before Hodgins could get onto it. At the Lancashire end Hunt had one to clear; in doing so he took more than two steps and the referee awarded a free kick in front.

The Lancashires now pressed getting in some good combination work, and were rewarded for their efforts in the closing stages. The ball struck the inside of the uprights and curved in the net. Just before the whistle Hunt had a hot, high one to save, but cleared nicely. The full time score was 2-1 for the Hollinger.
