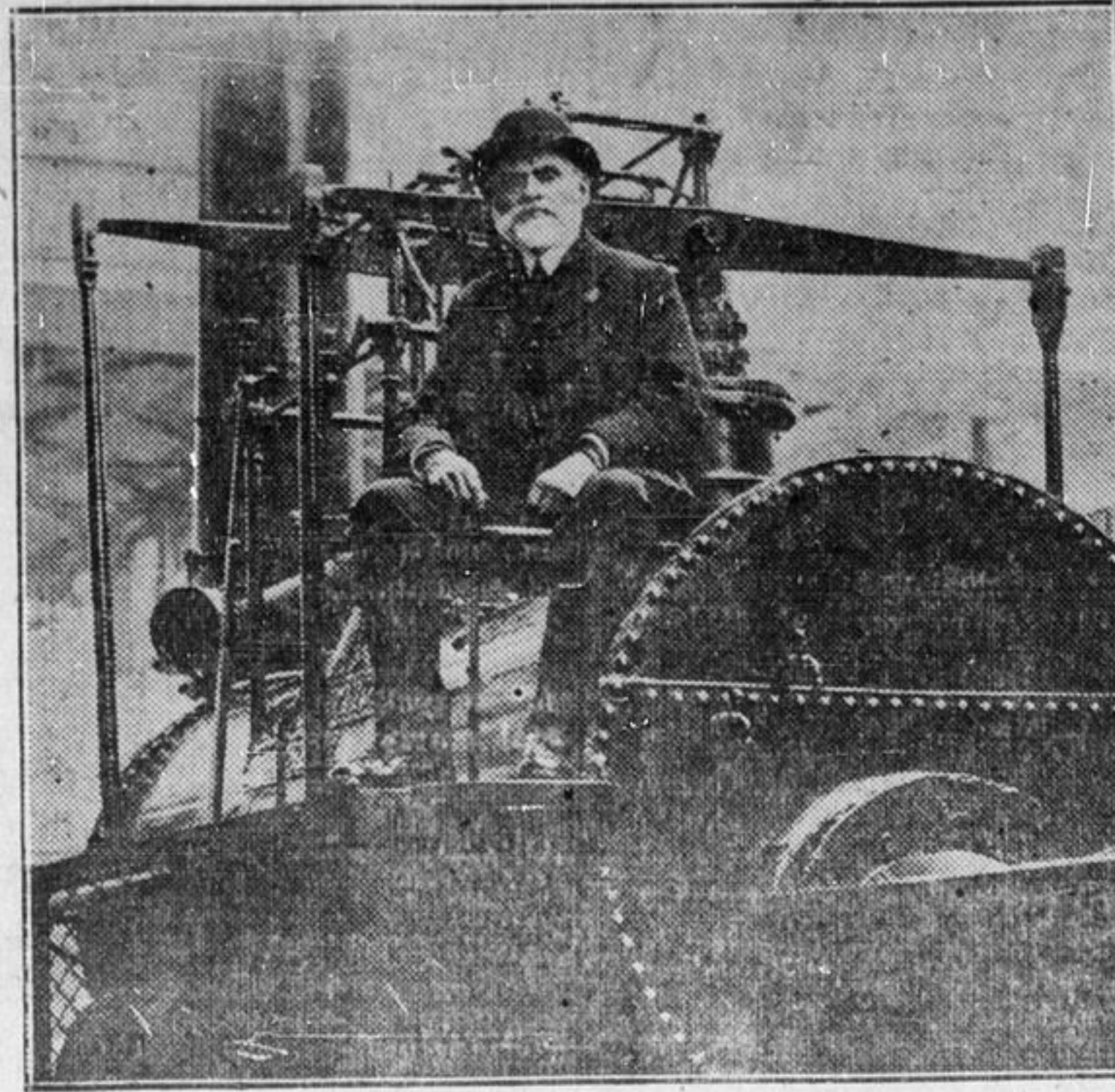

PART OF FREIGHT TRAIN FALLS FROM HIGH BRIDGE

On Friday afternoon last twelve cars of pulpwood and sulphite fell into the Krugersdorf River off one of the highest bridges on the whole T. & N.O. railway. The dozen cars were part of a heavy 61-car train from Iroquois Falls. The engine and thirty-one cars passed safely over the bridge, but the next ten cars went over. The following four were derailed, but remained on the high trestle, and the other cars held the rails. According to despatches from North Bay, early examination showed something had been trailing for about ten car-lengths before the train reached the bridge and it is believed the wreck was due to a broken truck. It is believed all the freight will be safely salvaged. Through traffic from the north was delayed a few hours by the accident, but as usual on the T. & N.O. Railway, no one was injured. In fact, again as usual, the damage was less than might be expected from an accident of this kind.

Attention! Householders!

Re Garbage

All table garbage should be wrapped in paper and placed in a covered garbage can. Garbage does not include ashes and chips and these must not be put in with garbage.

See that all lids are kept on your cans and that all doors of your toilets are kept closed.

Householders must supply their own garbage cans which should be kept clean and disinfected with chloride of lime.

Chloride of lime is supplied free of charge and can be had by applying at the City Hall.

Tin cans and other dry garbage may be put in covered barrels or boxes or bags.

Special attention should be paid to your yard. Keep it clean, and so avoid sickness and disease.

Outside toilets should be fly-proof, and should be disinfected quite often.

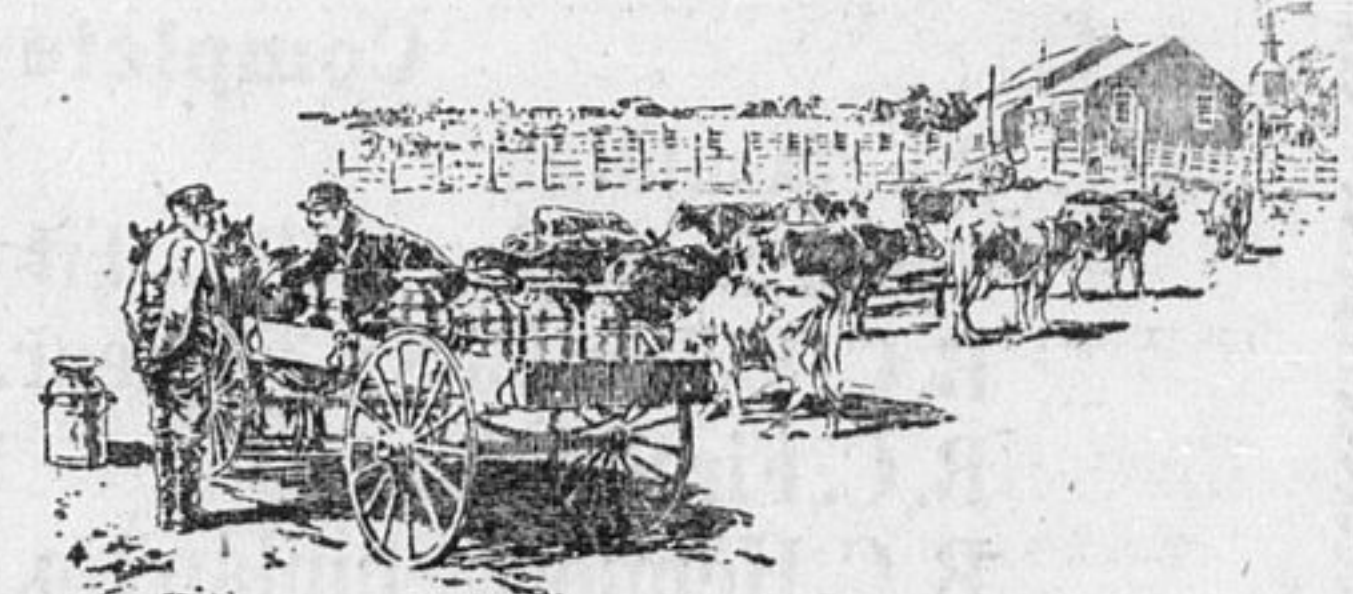
