McIntyre Mine Exceeds All Records of Previous Years

ANNUAL REPORT JUST ISSUED SHOWS MOST SATISFACTORY YEAR IN HISTORY OF THE MINE. DIVIDEND INCREASED TO 20 PER CENT. PROFITS OVER A MILLION AND A HALF FOR YEAR.

The annual report of the McIntyre Porcupine Mines, Limited, is a strikingly satisfactory one and must afford pleasure to the shareholders, officials and management. Accompanying the reports sent out to shareholders is an announcement that the stock is being placed on a 20 per cent. annual basis from Sept. 1st. The previous dividend rate was 15 per cent.

In the annual report of the President, Mr. J. P. Bickell it is pointed out that operations at the mine were carried on throughout the year on a large scale, made possible for the first time in several years by an adequate supply of hydro-electric energy. Mr. Bickell says that with the largely increased power facilities now available, it is very improbable that any future handicap in this respect can recur. The results obtained in development work during the past year are pronounced as being very favorable, especially on the lower levels. This is said to warrant preparation for future operations on a scale which cannot be put into effect economically through the present openings. The No. 5 and main shaft originally planned in connection with preliminary development work, have now attained a depth of 2,500 feet and have practically reached the limit of their capacity. The general trend of McIntyre ore body is toward the east and consequently it has been decided to start immediately sinking a central shaft 2,500 feet east of the present main shaft, having an objective of 4,000 feet in depth and of sufficient size to provide the necessary facilities for economical mining.

Mr. Bickell reports that further substantial interest in adjoining property has been acquired by the company during the year. McIntyre now owns 75 per cent. interest in the Platt Veteran property on the southeast boundary and 98 per cent. of the Plenaunum property to the northeast.

The profit and loss statement shows operating profit before providing for taxes and depreciation amounting to \$1,502,846, which compares with \$915,224 for the preceding year. The net profit for the year before depreciation, transferred to surplus account was \$1,488,468, as against \$919,166 under this heading for the year ending June 30, 1923. Bullion recovery amounted to \$3,291,178. Operating costs aggregated \$1,615,453. Administrative and general expenses were \$172,878. Non-operating revenue amounted to \$77,537. Appropriation was made for municipal, Provincial and Dominion taxes for the current year amounting to \$91,914.

The surplus account shows that \$611,272 was the amount of the premium realized on the sale of 60,000

shares of capital stock. The sum of \$195,230 is added to the surplus as reinstatement of cost of Plenaunum shares and notes, previously charged to surplus account. Provision was made for depreciation on buildings and equipment to the extent of \$295,628.

The report of R. J. Ennis, General Manager, shows that 360,140 tons of ore were treated of an average value of \$9.69 and a gross value of \$3,488,863. Bullion recovered amounted to \$3,291,178 and contained 157,702 fine ounces of gold and 27,550 fine ounces of silver. Production at the mine since commencement of milling operations in 1912 aggregates 1,946,876 tons of an average value of \$10.05 a ton. The gross value of the ore milled is \$19,577,883, and the recovery per ton was \$9.51, giving a total value of bullion recovered amounting to \$18,513,589.

During the fiscal year 386,659 tons of ore were broken. The total ore hoisted was 360,356 tons, leaving an excess of 26,303 tons to be added to the broken ores reserves, which have been increased from 155,881 tons to 182,184 tons.

Mr. Ennis reports that the main shaft was continued from 2,208 to a depth of 2,531 feet, with stations at 2,250 and 2,375 feet depth. Development work was done on No. 3, 5, 7, 9 and 10 veins. The estimated ore reserves are placed at 1,167,064 tons, of which 604,350 is in McIntyre claim. Estimated ore reserves in McIntyre extensions claims was placed at 183,009 tons, on Jupiter claims 122,703 tons, on Plenaunum claims 14,818 tons and broken ore in stopes 182,184. With an average estimated assay value of \$9.70 a ton, the ore reserves are given a probable value of \$11,313,816. Mining costs are estimated at \$3,164.9. Milling costs are placed at .9853c per ton. The aggregate of operating costs is estimated at \$4,965.7. Additions to plant, buildings and equipment during the year amounted to \$176,966.

Mr. Ennis, in his comment, states that development work during the year has been satisfactory. The lower levels are opening up in gratifying manner and no adverse geological conditions have been noted as likely to interfere with the values, the character or general continuation of the vein system. The company has continued to examine prospects in Northern Ontario and Western Quebec, and now holds under option a number of claims upon which exploration work is being done.

TO BUILD NEW HOTEL ON VENDOME SITE, HAILEYBURY

The Haileyburian last week says that construction has started on the new hotel in Haileybury, according to an agreement which has been entered into between the Hotel Committee of the Board of Trade and Mr. Wm. Fleming who formerly owned and managed the Vendome Hotel. A number of the business men of the town have subscribed the sum of \$30,000 for the proposition, and Mr. Fleming will be given this sum on a mortgage. Continuing The Haileyburian says:

"Mr. Fleming will furnish the balance of the capital required for the building to be completed. Preliminary plans for the new building show that it will be approximately 66 feet by 86 feet. It will be three storeys high and of solid brick construction throughout. The building will be erected on the site of the former Vendome and the old foundation will be used. This is now being cleaned out and repaired where necessary. The new hotel will have approximately thirty-five rooms, five or six of them with baths. All rooms will have running water, hot and cold, and there will be included the necessary sample rooms, etc. Although the new hotel


