MUNICIPAL JOURNAL URGES PROPER MILITARY TRAINING

The Municipal Review of Canada published at Montreal, in a recent editorial article touched in common-sense way on the question of military training for boys. The Municipal Review has no interests or purposes to serve, except the interests and good of Canada as they appear. This is the attitude of the Municipal Review of Canada:—

"Again we urge most emphatically the urgent need of giving our boys military training; and this in spite of the Woman's Pax Association, and others of the pacifist school.

"Naturally, the German delegate in favour of peace, just as her country was before the war. But thinking people still believe that, with such uncivilized and treacherous nations as did exist and still survive, the only way to prevent the war is to be prepared for it.

"But apart from being prepared for war, the boy who has had military training is prepared for peace also. For we claim that such training makes a boy more alert, more obedient and more responsible. Anyone in the business world recognizes that even the errand lad whom he likes best is one who has had military training.

"Then again, military training means a better physical boy, for the drill has taught him how to walk and keep his chest out. And this is very necessary when the automobiles are making people forget how to walk or even stand.

"Miss Macphail, M.P., in the House of Commons, made a bitter attack on Kingston Military College, sneeringly saying that it turned out 'Snobs.' But if it had not been for such training, the women of Canada would have been under German rule to-day, and no woman would have been able to write M.P. after her name.

"Perhaps an occasional snob does emerge from Kingston. Even the most exclusive bodies have an occasional member of whom it should be ashamed. That august body, the House of Commons, cannot claim that every member is of that high statesmanlike calibre that should be found there."

There were 2400 pupils at the opening of Sudbury schools last week. The Public School roll carried 959 names, the Separate Schools had 1091 enrolled, and there were 348 on the High and Technical School rolls.

Haileybury is anxious to secure a complete list of those dying in the service of their country during the late war, these names to be inscribed on the memorial which it is proposed to erect at the County Town of Temiskaming. The Haileyburian publishes a list of forty-nine names, but it is thought there may be others not on the list and the request is made that any other names be forwarded to the committee.
