ASSOCIATED BOARDS TO MEET AT IROQUOIS FALLS

The Associated Boards of Trade will hold their next regular quarterly session at Iroquois Falls either this month or next. There are a number of resolutions to come before the meeting. Among those sent in by Timmins Board of Trade is one asking the Government to take up the Power question in this North Land. The resolution refers to the rumoured merger of the power interests, to the vital importance of power to the industries of the country, the need for power at the lowest possible rate and the necessity for safeguarding industries and people against possible monopolies. The resolution concludes with the request that legislation be presented and enacted to enable the development and distribution of all water power in New Ontario by the public at cost and to prevent any further development of power by private enterprise.

Another resolution from Timmins Board asks the Government to consider the British Columbia plan for primary education by correspondence courses. It is urged that such a plan, if practical, would provide education for hundreds of children of the setzlers who are now deprived of schooling. The plan has been in successful asse in British Columbia for five years and has also been adopted by Alberta.



THE PORCUPINE ADVANCE A Fine Appearing Building And As Fine As It Appears

TIMMINS NEW HIGH SCHOOL A CREDITABLE STRUCTURE, FIRE PROOF, COMMODIOUS, WELL-EQUIPPED, AND ATTRACTIVE. SIX BIG CLASSROOMS, SCIENCE AND CHEMISTRY ROOMS SPRAY WELL-APPOINTED GYMNASIUM. SHOWER AND BATHS, ETC.

Situated on an elevation of ground in what is generally known as West Timmins, the new high school can be seen from a considerable distance and from many sections of the Town. Its appearance is particularly attractive and artistic, and its accommodation, arrangement and equipment equal its prepossessing appearance. The accompanying picture gives some idea of the fine appearance of the new High School building, but to be fully appreciated the structure has to be seen and inspected. During their recent visit to Timmins Baron Byng and Lady Byng both expressed special pleasure at the handsome appearance and finished equipment of the new High School.

A two-storey structure of brick and tile, as nearly fire-proof as can be made, the school has a length of approximately 150 feet. There are ample grounds for the school, the equivalent of two blocks being reserved for the building and grounds. Upstairs and down, wide, high corridors run the whole length of the structure; the various rooms opening off the corridors. There are three entrances, a main entrance in the centre of the front, the boys' entrance at the one end, and the girls' entrance at the other. There are six big class rooms, approximately 36 feet by 22 feet each and with 14foot ceilings that give a pleasing spaciousness to the rooms. In addition, the building contains a special Physics Laboratory, a Chemistry Room, a Gymnasium, a Library, Teacher's Rooms, Cloak Rooms for both boys and girls,



Lavatories, Baths (spray baths for both boys and girls), and all the rest o a modern school equipment and accommodation.

The Chemistry Room and Physics Laboratory are specially well-equipped. Benches, tables, lockers, cabinets and other equipment have been provided in up-to-date style. A closed cabinet for use in making any noxious gases required in the experiments is a feature of the Chemistry Room. The equipment of the Physics Dept. includes a lantern of the latest type.

To most visitors the big gymnasium, with its complete and up-to-date equipment, will be of special interest. Among the equipment will be found:-the ladders, the trapeze, the parallel bars, the swinging rings, dumbs, Indian clubs, etc. There has also been provision made for the playing of basketball and softball. Healthful and wholesome exercise for the students has been well considered.

The library in one of the turrets of the building is provided with a PLANT FOR TIMMINS. goodly array of the classics and works of reference for the students.

The equipment of the various classrooms is of the very best. Modern days as a result of an injury to his desks and seats are both comfortable and convenient. The blackboards are of the best quality of genuine slate. There is an electric bell to call school, recess and dismissal. An electrical clock in each room keeps time, with emphasis on the special times, such as the opening and closing of classes during three weeks before he will be fully the day. Every room is provided with a special thermometer registering the exact temperature of the room. Drinking fountain and other comforts and conveniences for the students have been generously provided. At suitable places in the corridors there are supplies of hose and other fire prevention equipment for use in case of any danger of fire.

The interior finish of the building is both attractive in appearance and

serviceable. The building is heated by a steam heat equipment, the plant being located in a cement basement with ample provision for the storing of a supply of coal. A first-class ventilation system is installed, a hot air fan, fresh air distributor and other equipment practically assuring healthy air at proper temperature at all times.

There is every reason for pride in the new High School. It is a credit to the town, the High School Board, the contractors and all others concerned Messrs. ShultzeBros., of Brantford, were the contractors. The plumbing and heating work was cone by the old reliable firm of A. Brazeau & Son, Timmins. Mr. E. M. Allworth was the electrical contractor. Mr. F. Valois carried through the painting and decorating throughout. The architects were Pennington & Boyd, of Windsor, Ont., and the finished structure is a lasting tribute to their skill and design.

THE WEATHER HANDICAPS CROPS IN THE DISTRICT

Hay a Fair Crop. Peas and Beans Good. Roots Fairly Good. . Blueberries a Big Crop.

Settlers and others interested in the district appear to agree that this year's crops in this area will not be as good as usual. The weather has not been propitious. The hay crop, now harvested, has not been bad, but it would have been better with better weather. Grain has been good for a green crop, but naturally has been slow ripening on account of the

Roots have been fairly good. Anything that will stand the sold weather shows up well. Peas and beans have been very good crops. Beets have been unusually good. Cabbage and Turnips have been good crops this year. Potatoes in sandy loam have been below the average crop for this district; in lowlying land the potato crop has been a failure.

Some damage has been done by recent frosts. For instance, last week many of the settlers had their tomato crop frozen out of existence.

Some vegetable marrows of un usual size and quality are reported from up the river, but these were protected by blankets at night.

The native fruits this year sup ported a popular theory that when blueberries are a big crop the raspberries are poor. Blueberries this year were a bountiful crop, while the raspberries were neither plentiful nor of quality to write home about.
