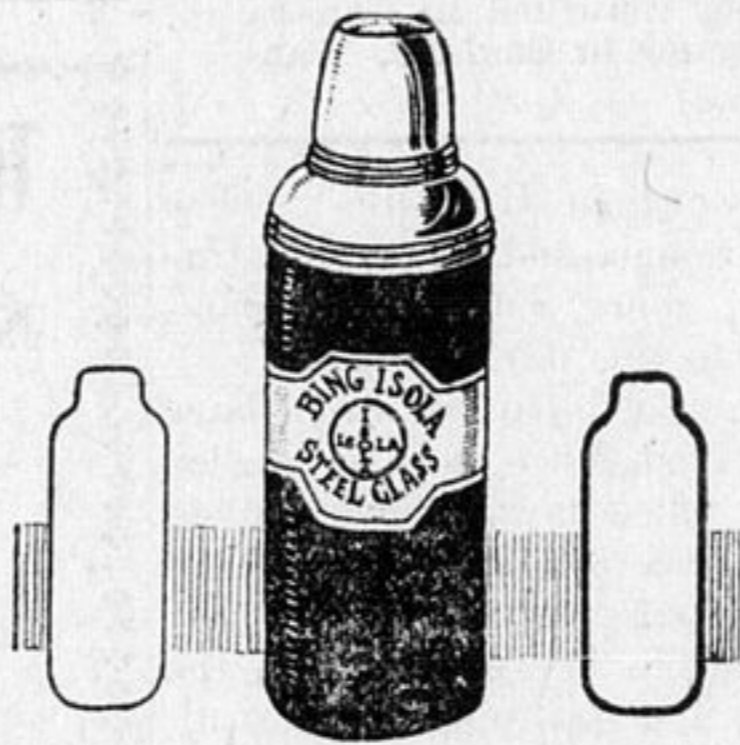

## FIVE HUNDRED MORE BOOKS FOR THE LIBRARY

To be loaned by the Government. Membership of Public Library Now 337. In August 1278 Books Were Taken Out.

Timmins Public Library has made unusual success since its opening some weeks ago. For the half month of July during which the Library was in use, there were 429 books taken out. In August there were 1278. The total membership to date is 337, which is specially noteworthy for a new library in a town this size. The Librarian, Mrs. D. Grimston, reports the reading room as being equally popular and successful. Large numbers of people are using the reading room regularly and it is proving a decided convenience and advantage to the town.

Last Thursday the regular monthly meeting of the Library Board was held, and as usual it was well attended. The success of the Library, of course, is due in large measure to the active interest shown by the members of the Library Board. It is a matter worthy for note that practically every member attends practically every meeting of the Board. If a member of the Board is absent from a meeting it is a safe wager that the member so absent is either ill or absent from town. Active interest and effort on the part of the Board has contributed much to the success of the Library and Reading Room.

Patrons of the Library will be pleased to know that five hundred new books will be added to the Library in the very near future. These five hundred new books are being loaned by the Ontario Government and will include a wide variety of good reading. These volumes will be loaned to the Timmins Library for a year or so.

## TIMMINS DOGS WIN PRIZES AT NATIONAL EXHIBITION

At Toronto Exhibition last week Timmins won several noteworthy prizes for fine dogs exhibited in the Dog Show at the big fair. Mr. J. N. Levine's Scotch Collies took a first, a second and a special prize. Mrs. John Massie's Cocker Spaniel won third in a class of forty-one exhibited. There were prize dogs from all over the United States, Canada and some other countries among the canines exhibited, so the honours won by Timmins' exhibits are particularly worthy of note.

## COBALT SPECIAL POLICE HAD TOO MANY FRIENDS

As noted in The Advance last week so many complaints were made at Cobalt about noisy drunks at nights in certain sections of the town that the Council decided to put on a special man to clean up. The first man put on did not last. He had too many friends apparently and the result was that in a few hours "the sidewalk was not wide enough for him," as one Councillor phrased it. The special officer had been highly recommended and had given good service as a special policeman on previous occasions, but evidently he fell a victim to one of the curses of the trade,—the tendency of some people to show their friendliness to a police officer by feeding him liquor. No one offering liquor to an officer on duty is any friend to that officer. Usually he is actuated by exactly opposite motives to those of friendliness. He simply desires in mean fashion to "get one on the police," while pretending to let the officer "have one on him." Considerable sympathy should be expressed by good sports for the stand of the North Land policeman who some years ago "beat up" one of these "friends" for offering him a drink. The usual method is to take the "friend" and the liquor in charge and have a friendly time before Magistrate Atkinson. The special officer at Cobalt, however, was not wise enough apparently to do this, and as a consequence he lost his position in disgrace. Another man was put on last week-end and it is to be hoped that he will equal the meanness of any "friend" offering him liquor by "befriending" that "friend" to the extent of a free stay in the cells.

## MEETING OF PORCUPINE POULTRY ASSOCIATION

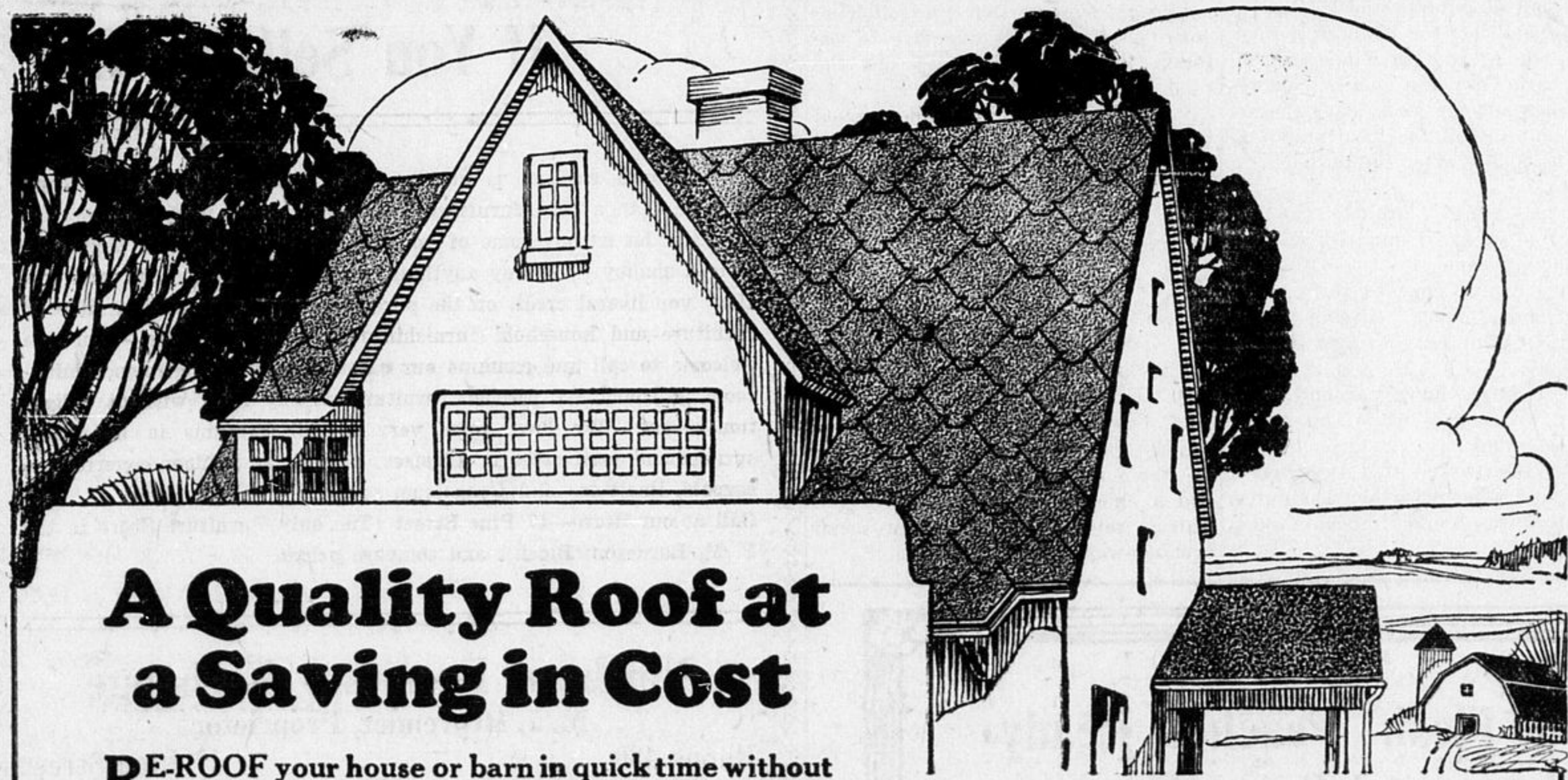

## NEW BOARD IS ELECTED BY PORCUPINE DAVIDSON

There was a meeting held in Toronto on Thursday last for the purpose of electing directors for the Porcupine Davidson Gold Mines. There were some noticeable differences of opinion at the meeting, the majority of the shareholders present favouring one course, while the minority represented a very much larger number of shares of stock with the accompanying overwhelming voting power. Ninety-five shareholders, representing 162,717 shares, voted for the original board, which included Messrs. H. H. Sutherland and J. J. Davis. Twelve shareholders, representing 765,897 shares, voted for the new board which replaced Messrs. Sutherland and Davis with Messrs. Wilkinson and Briggs. Protest was made by several present against the proceedings as unwarranted, but those desiring the change had the votes by large majority and were apparently within their rights and the legal rules of the case. The new board of directors elected for the Porcupine Davidson is as follows:—Sir Archibald Mitchellson, Major Gerald Hooper, Howard Bridgewater, Col. Robt. Stark, Robert Fennell, E. H. Wilkinson and W. A. Briggs.
