**TORONTO TRAIN SERVICE  
SHOULD BE CONTINUED**

As soon as announcement was made that the Toronto-Timmins trains would not be operated any longer on Sundays there was prompt protest from the Timmins Board of Trade. This was followed by equally emphatic protest from the Associated Boards of Trade meeting at Iroquois Falls. When the men from all over the North were gathered together there was general agreement as to the need and desirability of this service. It was realized that the service was of convenience and value to the people and was receiving patronage that warranted its continuance. Parochialism, however, can enter into a question like this. The Northern News of Cobalt apparently finds the service is not particularly advantageous to Cobalt, so has an editorial knock for the criticism regarding the discontinuance of the service. "Frankly, it might be doubted if there is any real necessity for running four trains along the T. & N.O. on Sunday," says The News. Frankly, it may be stated without doubt in reply, that while Cobalt may not have any particular need for the service, the need is quite apparent for this thriving camp of Porcupine, and the inconvenience and loss here much more than it will be in the case of Cobalt. Time may be no object in Cobalt, but in this progressive city it is a matter of vital importance to the people. The Sunday service was of general benefit to the North as a whole and to the Porcupine in particular. It is regrettable that the Northern News makes it appear that unless a case is of special and direct advantage to Cobalt it can not look for support from that quarter. This section of the North has been generous in co-operating with Cobalt in matters of general interest, even though the Porcupine might not be directly benefitted or even particularly affected. Nothing will be gained by Cobalt showing a different attitude. Much may be lost to all concerned.

**KEEP SOBER OR KEEP  
AWAY FROM MOTOR CARS.**

During the past few weeks there have been several different automobile accidents in the district, common report placing the blame for the mishaps on the fact that one driver or another, or both, had lost full control of the automobile through being slightly under the influence of intoxicating liquor. No harm occurred to any person through any of the accidents referred to, but this was only a matter of luck. It is only luck that has prevented a score or more of serious accidents in this district when men have attempted to drive motor cars without having perfect control, the drivers themselves being under a type of spirit control. No man should presume to drive a car over which he has not the most complete control. With a car out of control, for any reason, the driver not only endangers his own life, but he places the lives of others in jeopardy. A man fuddled with over-indulgence in either booze or butter-milk should steer far away from the steering wheel of a motor car. With the brand of bootleg poison now common, the need of divorcing liquor from limousines should be apparent.

Johnnie Walker and Henry Ford should never travel in the same car. Those who have been in the foolish habit of breaking the law of the land and the law of common sense by attempting to drive motor cars when their control is gone should take warning. There has been a lot of luck in the matter of the driving of motor cars. But luck will not always hold—The fact that it has held so well in the past in itself is urgent warning to beware the present and the future. Like the proverbial worm, luck will eventually turn. Recent incidents suggest that the authorities are not trusting to luck. The authorities are active in enforcing the law, and the law is drastic. The city traffic here is too large and too precious to be at the mercy of mere luck. The safety of the public requires the greatest care and attention. No good sport will endanger the lives of others by carelessness or worse. No poor sport can be allowed to menace the public. Traffic here has grown to such an extent that accidents are probable even with the most skillful care and the best of luck. Timmins luck might well be proverbial, but you can lose even in a gold camp. Luck needs co-operation. Drivers should bear this in mind and support good luck by never driving a motor car that is not under perfect control.

**PARTRIDGE SHOT OUT OF  
SEASON AND ON SUNDAY**

Liquor Charge Also. Other Court  
Cases for This Week's Police  
Court.

Chief Greer, of Timmins, and Officer Bennett, of Schumacher, paid a visit to the home of Wm. Sarochan, in the Hollinger Townsite, on Sunday, and as a result a number of charges may eventuate. Some partridge were found still warm, though it was Sunday and so an offence to shoot the birds on this day. Further, it is the close season for partridge. Still further the accused man may also be liable to a charge of illegally having firearms not being a British subject. And further still a charge of having liquor in a public place may be preferred on account of the results of the proceedings of the day.

This is one case or series of cases for this week's court. And there are others in addition to the number of remands from last week. Magistrate Atkinson is going to have one of the busiest courts in his busy life.

There are half a dozen drunk cases. Two wage cases will be up for decision. One man faces a charge of being drunk and fighting. Another is accused of fighting without being drunk. Apparently a man can't fight when he's sober and he's not supposed to get drunk. So, what can he do! No wonder there's always talk of another war. Geo. Walchuk, 169 Pine street will answer to a charge of disorderly conduct. The case arises from a rather noisy dance at the house of the accused on Sunday. Alex Roseilon is charged with illegally having liquor. A couple will be before the court for riding on the sidewalks on bicycles. Domino Guilino is charged with illegally making liquor, the charge resulting from investigation made by Chief Greer and his staff. There is also a high-grade charge for the court, to which reference is made elsewhere in this issue. Including the various cases on remand, there are about half a hundred cases to come before Magistrate Atkinson this week.
