The annual meeting of the Caledonian Society of Timmins was held on Friday evening in the I.O.O.F. Hall with the largest attendance yet at any annual meeting. The Society enters its fifth year under the best of auspices. Friday evening there were no less than nineteen applications for membership accepted. The Official Pipers for the Society are Messrs. W. Bennett, Johnson and Small, enthusiastically elected by acclamation.

Messrs. Thomson and Hall were elected auditors.

The members of the Executive Committee were elected by acclamation as follows:—Messrs. A. Roberts, Geo. Ritchie, W. Forrester, J. Nicolson and H. McCullough. These with the officers and the past presidents form the executive of the Society.

A Ladies' Committee, with power to add to its number, was named as follows:—Mrs. Roberts, convener; Mrs. Stewart, Mrs. Shewan, Mrs. Cowan, Mrs. Ritchie, Mrs. W. D. Watt. The Ladies' Committee will add any others desired to its number and will act throughout the season.

Several important questions were before the meeting, including:—the matter of Halloween observance; a regularly engaged orchestra to assure music each evening without trespassing on the generosity of the musicians in the Society and of visitors; the question of providing badges for the members; the matter of a suitable hall for the rapidly growing Society. The Executive is to take up these questions at once, a special meeting being called at the residence of G. A. Macdonald, Past President, 16 Sixth Avenue, at 8 p.m. Friday evening of this week, Oct. 17th. The Ladies' Committee is co-operating in the matter of Halloween and announcement will be made later in regard to this event.

After the business of the meeting, a very pleasant social time was enjoyed. There were over 150 present and all had a very happy evening. Refreshments, in charge of the ever-ready and efficient A. Roberts, were up to the usual high standard. Old favourite dances were enjoyed, with some popular modern ones. Mr. F. Roberts delighted all with his fine voice and effective rendition of pleasing songs. Mr. Thos. Huntly tickled everybody with his expressive rendering of humorous songs. Mr. D. K. Macdonald's effective rendition of the reading, "A Wee Scotch Nicht," made a decided hit, all being enthusiastic over this selection in Braid Scots. Songs by Mr. Hale and Mr. J. Liddle were much appreciated. Mr. Hale's generous services at the piano were also specially valued. Mr. Liddle's attractive voice and effective rendition of pleasing selections brought unstinted applause. A brief address by Mr. M. B. Scott was one of the features of the evening, his witty retort to one careless interruption scoring a bullseye. Music for the evening was well-supplied by Mr. Hale at the piano and Mr. J. T. Bridges on the violin. Mrs. Mitchell also effectively assisted as one of the accompanists for the evening.

An extra special feature of the meeting, which it is hoped to have as a regular this season, was the playing of the pipes, Pipers Bennett and Small marching round the hall with the pipe music giving a real Scottish opening to the evening.

Adequate But Equitable Parking By-law Being Sought

Police Committee to Take Up Question With Board of Trade. Councillor Drew Advocates Instalment Payment for Taxes. Other Town Council Business at Regular Meeting on Monday.

Acting Mayor E. L. Longmore presided at the regular meeting of the Town Council on Monday afternoon, and Councillors J. H. Bacon, Geo. S. Drew, H. Charlebois, J. Morrison and F. M. Wallingford were present.

The representative of a fire extinguisher for use in homes, offices, etc., explained the merits of his apparatus. It was felt to be a question for the individual householder to consider the Town providing general fire protection facilities. The representative however, was told he could take the matter up further with the Fire & Light Committee if he wished.

The Acting Mayor called attention to the fact that there was the regular procedure for the revision of the municipal voters' list for the year. Some people were under the misapprehension that if their name was called at the recent sittings for the Plebiscite they would be on the list for a municipal vote. This was not the fact. The list revised last Saturday was only for Provincial purposes and had nothing to do with a municipal vote. Townspeople had until Oct. 25th to get their names on the municipal voters' list for this year.

Estimates for McNamara Bros., Leo Mascioli and the Warren Paving Co. for different amounts for work done were duly passed.

Councillor Drew informed Council that Hill-Clark-Francis had volunteered to put in a fire alarm box at the corner of First Avenue and Pine street. Permission for this was readily granted, the Town to maintain the box which will be a very useful one to have.

The matter of the parking of autos on the main streets was discussed. Eventually it was decided to have the Police Committee confer with the Board of Trade and draft a by-law that will be fair to all. "The business people are the ones chiefly concerned in this," said the Acting Mayor.

Councillor Charlebois brought up the question of the extra charge by the Town for the installing of sewer

and water service in wet ground. The Engineer explained that if the ground was found to be dry a refund was made. Connections were made with day labour.

Mr. G. H. Gauthier asked Council to pass the necessary resolution favouring the annexation of the strip of land near the High School. This was done and the required petition in the matter will be circulated by the residents of the section. Mr. Gauthier also agreed to use his influence to have the remaining strip included at the same time so that the whole section may be taken in.

Mr. Gauthier asked Council to endorse an agreement regarding the supplying of water to Schumacher, Melnyre Mine and the Platt Vet. Councillor Wallingford thought the agreement should not be hurried through. Eventually the matter was referred to the Fire & Light and Waterworks Committees, the Committees to meet that evening as Mr. Gauthier was leaving Tuesday for Toronto and wished the matter decided before he left.

A representative of the water meter company addressed the Council explaining the value of metering the larger services. He was asked to leave details of prices, plans, etc., with the Town Engineer.

Councillor Drew called attention to the need for some 25 new lights in town. The matter was referred to the Fire & Light Committee.

Councillor Drew also urged the consideration of the plan of having town taxes payable in two instalments. With the one collection, the taxes proved a heavy burden on business. Not only had the merchants their own taxes to pay, but collections were poor for them because others had the full taxes to meet. Two payments he thought would ease the situation. Acting Mayor Longmore was not sure it would work that way, and he pointed out that collecting by instalments meant that the cost of collection would be doubled. The question was left over for further consideration.

SPECIAL BRONZE MEDAL FOR POULTRY SHOW HERE

There was a meeting of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Show last night and arrangements further advanced for the big annual Show in January next. Announcement was made that the Poultry Review had kindly donated a Bronze Medal for the Show to be added to the growing list of medals, trophies and prizes.

There was a big turnout last night and much interest is being maintained in the coming Poultry and Pet Stock Show, the event promising to eclipse anything in its line yet held in the North Land. The next meeting of the Association is called for Wednesday evening, Oct. 29th, at the Town Hall.

Toronto District Kiwanis To Visit Timmins This Week

One Hundred Kiwanis From Toronto and Other Places Expected Here Friday Evening. Big Preparations Made for Their Entertainment. Banquet and Dance, Etc., to be Provided.

On Friday evening of this week one hundred Kiwanis from Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph, Galt, Barrie and other southern points are expected here to visit the local Kiwanis. They will arrive here on the six o'clock train Friday evening, there being three special Pullman cars on that train for their accommodation.

Great preparations have been made for the entertainment of the visitors who will be chiefly prominent business and professional men of Toronto and district. They will be the guests of the Timmins Kiwanis while here. Immediately on arrival they will be taken to the Masonic Hall where there will be a Banquet in their honour on Friday evening. There was no regu-

lar Kiwanis luncheon yesterday, the Banquet Friday evening to take its place. The visitors will be shown the Mines and the Towns. 1000 NAMES ADDED HERE FOR PLEBISCITE VOTE

Mr. Geo. A. D. Murray, Agent for Moderationists, Puts on 937 Names at Timmins.

At the sittings here on Saturday of His Honor Judge Caron as Revising Officer for the Voters' Lists for the vote on October 23rd on the Plebiscite, Mr. Geo. A. D. Murray, local representative of the Moderation League, had 937 names added to the list. Mr. E. L. Longmore certified to a number of other names to be added to the lists on behalf of the Ontario Plebiscite Committee, the Prohibition organization in the campaign. In all about 1,000 names were added to the Timmins list. The list used as a basis was the 1923 Municipal Voters' Lists. Those not on this list had to apply to the Revising Officer to be put on. In most cases the application was made through the representative of either one side or the other on the question, though there were a number of personal applications also before the Judge. As noted above about 1,000 names were added to the list here. As Judge Caron pointed out at the sitting this list applies only to the Provincial Plebiscite Vote, and has no connection whatever with Municipal voting. Those who wish to have a Municipal vote must follow the usual course in seeing that their names are on the Timmins Municipal Voters' List.

BEAVER WOOD FIBRE MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Plant Had Been Purchased by Double Diamond Co., but Delivery Not Made.

Fire of unknown origin last week destroyed the plant and mill of the Beaver Wood Fibre Company, located at Frederickhouse near Cochrane. The plant had been purchased by the Double Diamond Lumber Co. and it was the intention to install it in the new mill at Timmins. Other arrangements will now have to be made. The plant had not been delivered under the agreement, so fortunately the Double Diamond Company will not be losers, except to the extent that they had made a mighty good buy in the purchase of the Beaver Board plant and so will need to replace the plant that was arranged for at so favourable a figure.

According to word from Cochrane the fire which destroyed the roasting and planing mill of the Beaver Board Fibre Co. at Frederickhouse occurred on Wednesday afternoon. The fire started from some unknown cause in a pile of edgings on the river bank some five hundred feet away from the mill. At one o'clock, about twenty minutes after the fire was noticed at the river bank, the mill was on fire and was completely destroyed within an hour. A large pile of pulpwood nearby was saved through the good work of some Forestry Branch men who arrived on the scene and prevented the spread of the fire. The C.N.R. tank car also assisted materially in the fire-fighting, the camp buildings also being saved from the fire.

Only Eleven Days This Year for the Partridge Season

Government Decides to Have Open Season From Oct. 15th to Oct. 25th Only. Birds Scarce This Year, According to Reports. Other Close Seasons.

Mr. Luxton, Game Warden, Cochrane, spent the week-end in the Camp and as a result there will be a couple of dozen cases before the police court here this week for breach of the game laws. Among these cases will be one against a resident for having firearms while being an alien. Others are charged with illegally having partridge out of season, and still others with hunting on Sunday. When one man, who had been arrested for breach of the game laws, was searched at the police station here he was found to be in possession of a quantity of gold ore for which he could not satisfactorily explain.

Mr. Luxton points out that the partridge season this year has been considerably shortened. The Government had considered the doing away altogether with the open season for partridge this year, but eventually it has been decided to have the open season for partridge only from Oct. 15th to Oct. 25th,—eleven days. Partridge

this year have been reported as unusually scarce and the shortening of the season is to protect the birds in this off season.

The following is a summary of the open seasons this year:—

The open season for partridge this year in territory north of Mattawa River and C.P.R. is from the 15th of October until October 25th, and only ten birds may be taken by any one person.

The open season for deer, moose and caribou north of Mattawa and C.P.R. is from October 25th to November 30th, both inclusive. The deer license has been increased to \$4.00. The moose license to \$6.00.

The open season for beaver and otter is from December 15th to March 31st, both days inclusive.

Open season north of French River and C.P.R. for racoon, mink, marten and fisher, November 1st to March 31st.
