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McINTYRE EARNINGS FOR QUARTER ENDING SEPT. 30

The official statement for the quarterly earnings of McIntyre Porcupine Mines, Limited, for first quarter ending Sept. 30th, 1924, is as follows:—Gross recovery, \$903,790.27; costs, including development, \$463,475.75; operating earnings, \$440,314.52; non-operating revenues, \$20,371.35; total, \$460,685.87. Less provision for taxes for period, \$32,313.88. Net earnings before plant depreciation, \$428,371.99.

WINTER MOTOR VEHICLE WILL GO 10 MILES PER HOUR

Mr. G. G. Horner, vice-president and chief engineer of the Canadian Autosleigh Co., Ltd., was a recent visitor to Timmins and intends to return here as soon as the deep snow comes to demonstrate his new autosleigh. The autosleigh is built on the principles embodied in the tractor and the tank and is operated by a motor similar to that used in automobiles, but with the distinctive features necessary for winter travel. Mr. Horner says the Autosleigh is light and convenient and will travel over any snow road and that the depth of the snow is no particular handicap. It will make around ten miles per hour. When the snow comes to stay, Mr. Horner intends to give a complete demonstration in Timmins of the value and virtue of the Autosleigh as a means of winter travel.

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TORONTO WORLD REPORT OF ONTARIO CUP MATCH

Timmins Registers Winning Goal in Last Sixty Seconds, Says Toronto Paper in Excellent Writeup.

The Toronto Sunday World this week had one of the best reports of Timmins match at Toronto in the Ontario Cup series. The writeup is regarded by those who saw the match as particularly clear, fair and accurate. It is published herewith in full, as it appeared under the heading, "North Ontario Champs Win From Mimico". (By Staff Reporter)

Ossington Field, Oct. 18.—The crowd was slow in gathering here this afternoon to witness the Ontario Cup game between Timmins, champions of the North Country, and Mimico, Toronto district winners. Mimico have out the same team that won from the Beaches last week, while the visitors are without the services of their right full back, but are confident of being returned winners. Ten minutes after the advertised time Referee Cameron lined the teams up as follows:—

Mimico—T. McAlpine, Smith, Allan, Bailey, McKillop, Freck, Howitt, G. McAlpine, McDonald, Moffatt, Half-day.

Timmins—A. Cadman, Liddell, Hetherington, Cooper, F. Cadman, Street, Dunn, Sathrang, Peterson, Berg, Dunbar.

First Half

Timmins won the toss and set Mimico to face the sun. The game was fast at the outset, both goals having narrow escapes. Berg and McDonald having good tries. Mimico were the smarter team, but the Miners' defence were a bustling lot and did not stand for any fineness. A pass from McKillop to Howitt led to the opening goal. The wings, benefitting by a mistake by the visitors' defence, scored easily, the goal keeper falling in an effort to clear. Within two minutes C. Sathrang equalized the score after nice play by Peterson. It was easily seen, provided the visitors last the pace, that Mimico were not going to have it all their own way, Peterson causing Smith and Allan a lot of trouble.

Nice work by McAlpine and McDonald gave Howitt a chance, but his paring shot went past. The next minute the right-winger put a perfect ball at McDonald's foot, but the centre shot high over. Beautiful combination by Cooper, Dunn and C. Sathrang looked dangerous but the latter put the ball too far ahead, and a good opening was lost. The visitors were a dangerous lot at this stage, their long, swinging passes keeping Smith and Allen on the jump to keep their goal intact, though one shot from Peterson almost beat McAlpine, who saved at the post. McDonald was trying hard to put his team in the lead, and when Cadman run out to clear should have made a score, the ball going past the post just as half-time was called.

Half-time: Mimico 1, Timmins 1.

Second Half

The crowd had increased considerably when Peterson set Timmins off, but luck was certainly with the visitors in the first few minutes. Bad shooting and the posts kept Mimico from scoring.

Shaking off the pressure Peterson broke through the centre, but clever tackling by Allan stopped his progress. A foul against Cooper was well placed by Fleck, but Liddell cleared finely. Both teams were playing hard for the lead and some fine football was witnessed, but the defences prevailed. A brilliant try by Peterson gave the Mimico supporters a fright, the ball just swerving past the post.

Timmins were continually in the Mimico half at this stage, and only for the fine work of Allan, the visitors should have scored.

A break-away by Howitt looked dangerous, but only a corner resulted, which was cleared. Due to the excitement, some of the players lost their temper, and some unnecessary fouling was shown, McDonald, especially being an offender.

The visitors were standing up under the strain, and on their second half display, should have been on the lead, but their luck was out. Bailey fouled Sathrang when he was going through, but nothing came from the free kick. The pressure, however, was bound to tell, and Berg put the visitors in the lead a minute from the finish. Just on time, Moffatt hit the post, Timmins deservedly winning by 2 goals to 1.

Timmins 2, Mimico 1.
