Timmins and District Notes

Mr. W. W. Orr was called to Alwyn, Que., on Sunday, owing to the serious illness of his mother.

Mrs. Briggs returned home to Toronto last week after visiting friends in Timmins during the summer.

The boys greatly appreciate this friendly expression of good wishes from the other Northern Ontario District.

An elderly man named Angus McDonald is said to have attempted suicide at Cobalt last week, according to a despatch in The Ottawa Journal. It is claimed that he waited until the train from Englehart was on the Lang street crossing and then approached the track, taking up a crouching position just south of the main road. He was thrown to one side by the engine and sustained cuts about the face and head but is not seriously injured.

Haileybury has probably the first case of its kind in the North Land in the claim for damages by Mr. J. Seguin, of New Liskeard, for injuries to himself and damages to his wagon when he was struck by the fire team on its way to a response to a call—the call being a test one from the Fire Underwriters' Inspector. The claim is to be taken up with the Town Solicitor of Haileybury, some of the Councillors being of the opinion that the streets should be kept clear when there is a fire alarm.
