**C.N.R. VICE-PRESIDENT
SEES BIG FUTURE FOR NORTH**

Mr. W. D. Robb, vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, who was in Timmins some days ago on his tour of the North Land, has been speaking enthusiastically about this North Land to newspapers elsewhere. To The Sudbury Star Mr. Robb said he covered the large area in Cochrane district and for some distance west and he had found the land very suitable for new settlers.

There had been vast improvement in farming conditions in this particular section of Northern Ontario, and many of the settlers reported splendid crops this year. He was particularly impressed by the vigorous effort of many of the farmers to improve their farms, with the result that conditions were assuming a normal basis. Farmers were beginning to realize that the experimental stage had passed. Many of the pioneers in the North Country had developed splendid farms, which were well stocked and equipped with the most modern types of farming machinery.

Mr. Robb said he made the trip for the purpose of securing first hand information and he was convinced that the time was not far distant when the new wheat belt of Ontario would be widely populated with settlers from the old land.

**NORTH BAY ORGANIZES
FOR OLD BOYS' RE-UNION**

North Bay has organized for the Old Boys' Re-Union at that town in August of next year. At a meeting last week it was decided that the best way to get things under way would be to elect officers and this was started by the election of John Ferguson, one of the real pioneers of the town, for the position of president. Mr. Ferguson was for several years Mayor of North Bay, and is noted as one of the town's most loyal and popular citizens. Mayon J. H. McDonald, Wilfred Aubry, Dr. J. H. McDougall and Pat McCool were named as the vice-presidents. Stress was laid on the importance of a secretary who had not only the ability but the time to devote to the work and it was decided that an effort would be made to secure the services of H. P. Charlton. C. J. Know was the choice for treasurer.

Dr. McDougall, who has shown a capable and energetic spirit in promoting the Old Boys' Re-Union idea was given charge of the publicity and will select a committee to assist in this work. Mr. N. J. McCubbin is in charge of the Transportation section, Mr. A. Jackman will direct the decoration and lighting committee, Mayor McDonald is chairman of the civic reception committee, Mr. A. C. Rorabeck the entertainment committee, Mr. J. O. McKerron the railroads, Mr. J. H. Patterson the programme committee, Mr. F. A. York the bands and music committee, and Mr. J. W. Richardson the finance committee.

North Bay is energetically and whole-heartedly taking up the Re-Union idea, and the North Bay Home Week in August, 1925, promises to be a big event.
