**COMMITTED FOR TRIAL
 ON CHARGE OF ASSAULT**

Officer Martin Accused by Man Arrested for Drunkenness. Other Cases at Police Court.

At the police court on Thursday last the case arousing most interest was the charge of assault made by E. Gignac against Constable D. Martin. The charge arose from the arrest of Gignac some weeks ago down the River Road. Gignac in police court pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk, and the following week, he laid the charge of assault against Constable Martin, accusing the latter of using unnecessary force in making the arrest. The evidence of a number of witnesses was heard Thursday and Magistrate Atkinson committed Constable Martin for trial before a Judge. No evidence was taken for the defence, this being reserved for the trial before the Judge. Constable Martin denies the charge, and has several witnesses for his side of the case. Until the result of the trial before the Judge is known, Officer Martin will not be on active duty as a town constable.

The next most interesting case to the public generally was that against V. Frettaoin who was charged with being drunk in charge of a motor car. There was much excitement and a big crowd around on the previous Sunday when Frettaoin and a companion were arrested, the latter for interfering with the police. A woman, who also attempted to hamper the police, was another feature of the Sunday evening event. Magistrate Atkinson remanded the Frettaoin case to this week.

Two drunks paid \$10.00 and costs each, and two others were assessed \$20.00 and costs each, the latter two having been fined a week on so previously on the same charge, and the charges for this sort of thing increasing with frequency, as it were.

G. Rial, for a breach of the O.T.A., paid \$100.00 and costs.

Peter Peterick was sentenced to six months in jail. The charge against him was that he smashed his way through a window and attempted to assault a woman in the house thus entered.

Magistrate Atkinson settled a couple of wages cases under the Master and Servants Act.

The charge regarding proper fire escape for hotel, laid by Inspector T. H. Constable against T. Kowalsky, was remanded until called upon. This means that if the proper safeguards are provided the accused will hear no more about the matter.

The case against a local store of illegally selling firearms to an alien was dismissed.

J. Mendel on the charge of selling fruit without the necessary municipal license was given a remand of another week.

**HAILEYBURY MEMORIAL

The Haileybury Memorial Fund continues to grow, contributions still coming in at good rate. The total paid in to date is about \$2800.00. It is expected that His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario will unveil the Memorial on Nov. 24th. The monument was received last week and has been erected on the site prepared at the corner of Main street and Georgina Avenue, Haileybury.

**FRIDAY THIS WEEK LAST
 DAY FOR PAYING TAXES.**

Ratepayers should specially note that Friday of this week, Nov. 14th, is the last day for paying municipal taxes without the added penalty of five per cent. Originally, it was intended to add the penalty after Oct. 31st, but representations were made to the Council that the time was too short after receiving the notices, and Councillor Longmore took up the question with the result that the time for payment without penalty was extended to Nov. 14th. After Nov. 14th a penalty of 5 per cent. will have to be paid on all overdue taxes.

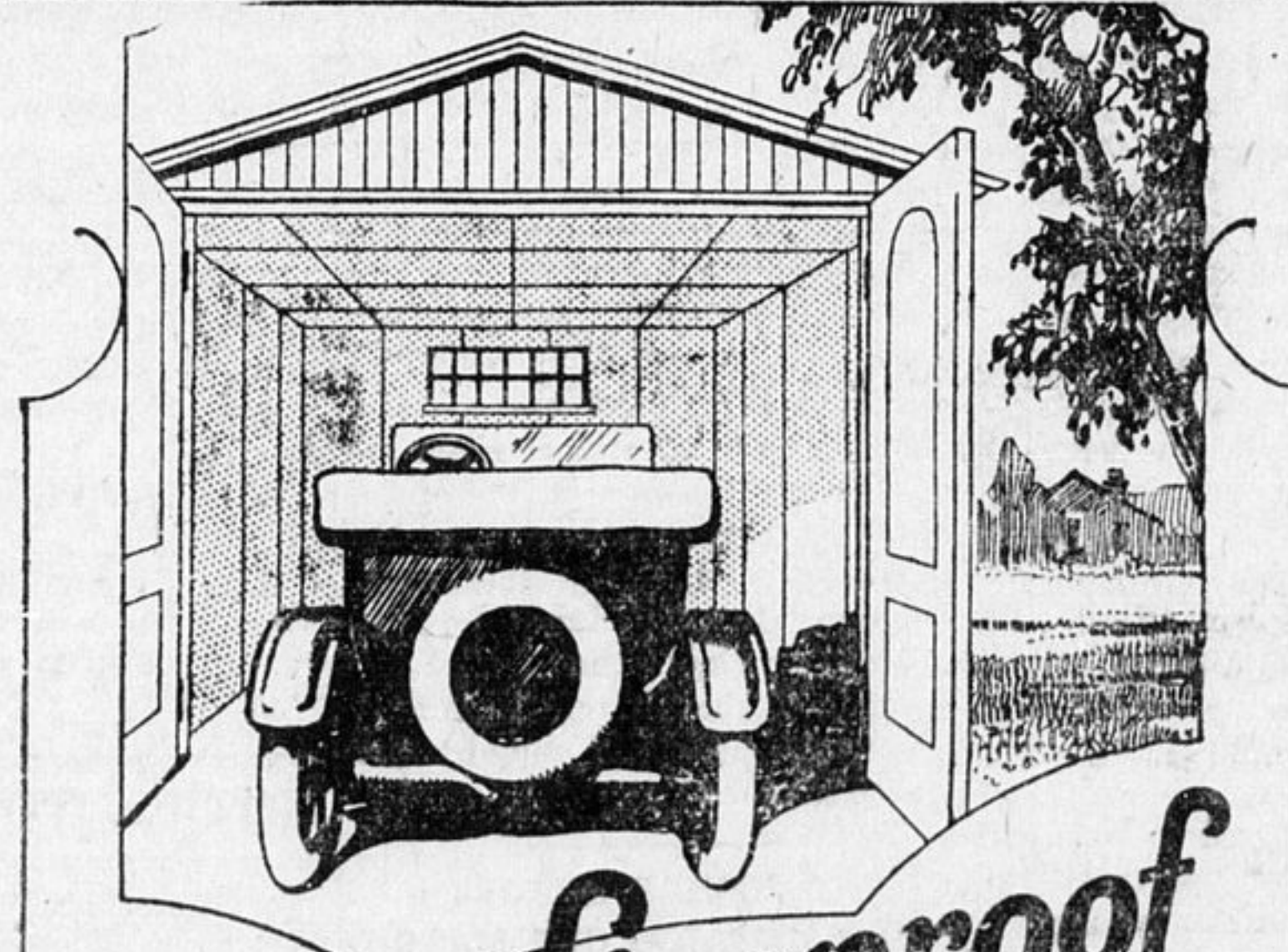
