**HOSPITAL FOR
SICK CHILDREN**

67 COLLEGE ST., TORONTO

Dear Mr. Editor:—
Your readers have probably had their appetite for statistics satiated during the past few months. Still they will, no doubt, want to know something of the work accomplished by the hospital to which they have so generously contributed in the past. They are shareholders in a Mission of Mercy. Their dividends are not paid in coin of the realm. May I trespass upon your space to outline what those dividends are?

Firstly, the daily average of children occupying cots in the Hospital for Sick Children was 255. The total cared for as in-patients was 6,397. That is equivalent to the population of a good-sized Ontario town.

And secondly, the out-patient department. This is a wing of offices given over to consultation and minor operations. On an average there were 190 young callers a day.

That is where the dividends are earned—in the difference made in the lives of thousands of children through the voluntary contributions which render it possible to maintain an institution where pallid cheeks become rosy and twisted limbs are made straight.

If that were not dividend enough, one might try to estimate the enormous salvage of child-life in Ontario which has taken place since "Sick Kids" doctors and "Sick Kids" nurses have been going out through this province equipped with a knowledge of children's diseases, which they could not get except in some such highly specialized and pre-eminently efficient institution as the Hospital for Sick Children.

On this year's service the Hospital expended \$345,126 and finds itself in the hole to the extent of \$134,284. What comes in around Christmas-time keeps the Hospital going. So long as the word "Christmas" retains its original significance could any charity possibly enlist more of the sympathy of your readers or entitle itself to more of their support?

**ARE THE WOLVES LIKELY
TO EXTERMINATE DEER?**

The following is a special despatch from Lee Valley to The Sudbury Star:—

"Deer are not very plentiful this season in this district. Unless the Government increases, rather than diminishes, the bounty on wolves, the surviving deer will be mostly in parks and game reserves. Wolves are certainly driving out or exterminating the deer. To make matters worse rabbits are this year dying off because of some disease and we are told this occurs at regular periods of about five or seven years. Glancing at prices quoted for wolf hides one must come to the conclusion that the Government isn't generous, but rather playing safe."

**MANY FROM TIMMINS ON
JURY FOR GENERAL SESSIONS**

A number from Timmins have been summoned to do jury duty at the General Sessions of the Peace at Cochrane next week. The court opens on Tuesday and there are many Timmins and Porcupine cases on the list. Chief among these is the case usually referred to as the "White Slavery" case, in which the charges include the detention of a woman at a Pine street place for immoral purposes. Several high-grade charges will also be heard, including cases from here and from the Dome. The man charged with theft from one of the change rooms at the Hollinger will also be before the court. Another specially interesting case is that against the Levines, of Kapuskasing, the charges arising from recent bankruptcy proceedings. A number of charges were laid but all but two were either withdrawn or dismissed. Mr. A. C. Brown, of Timmins, will be the counsel for the Levines in the cases.

Mr. Russell, who was at one time Manager of the Technical Division of the C.X.L., had a genius for making friends. He was an ardent sportsman, being an effective hockey player, and an old-time football player having played on some notable rugby teams.
