The Unwrought Metal Sales Act 1924.



All parties interested will please take notice that the above-named Act will come into force on the first day of November, 1924.

The Act provides that no unwrought gold, silver, platinum, palladium or any other precious or rare metal or metals shall be bought, sold, dealt in, received or disposed of by way of barter, pledge or otherwise, except under authority of a license issued by the undersigned. "Unwrought metal" as defined in the Act includes the ores of such metals as well as nuggets or "metallies" so-called, and generally the metals aforesaid whether refined or unrefined, in any form whatever, not made up and manufactured into any finished article or thing for use, ornament or other purpose.

Offences against the Act are punishable as follows:—For a first offence, a penalty not exceeding \$500 and liability to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one year, and for a second or any subsequent offence, a penalty not exceeding \$1000 and imprisonment for one year.

Applications for licenses under the Act must be made to the undersigned on a form prescribed by the Regulations, accompanied by a fee of two dollars. Forms and copies of the Regulations may be obtained at the Department of Mines, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.
