North Land Highway to be Completed Within Two Years

Premier Ferguson Makes Important Announcement at Luncheon Given Ontario Boards of Trade by City of Toronto Last Week. Start of Work Promised to be in the Immediate Future.

Within two years you will be able to get in your motor car at the King Edward and travel right through to the mines at Timmins and to Cochrane. Work on the highway from North Bay will be started in the near future, I might say, immediately. This was the announcement made at the luncheon given by the City of Toronto on Thursday last to the delegates at the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade meeting in the city. At this event held in Sunnyside Pavilion particular attention was given to the North Land. There were about 200 guests present, a goodly percentage of them being North Land men.

The speakers at the luncheon included the Premier, Hon. Chas. McCrea and a representative of the City of Toronto. The event was a very pleasing one and typical of the kind hospitality extended to the delegates all through their visit. The Premier and the Minister of Mines were given most enthusiastic reception, the eloquent address of the Minister of Mines on the North Land being especially appreciated. His summary of the great needs of the North was greeted with prolonged applause. "We need," he said, "publicity to tell the world of the resources we have, and capital to set in motion the wheels of industry."

LAST REGULAR MEETING OF TIMMINS COUNCIL

Routine Business Chiefly Before the Board. Matter of Unemployment Discussed.

The last regular meeting of the 1924 Council was held Monday afternoon, with the Mayor in the chair and Councillors J. H. Bacon, L. Longmore, F. M. Wallingford, H. Charlebois, Geo. S. Drew and J. Morrison present.

An account from the Hospital for Sick Children at Toronto was passed, but the Town Solicitor will be consulted to see if the amount can be collected from the stepfather of the child treated.

The cheque of the Warren Paving Co. was authorized for return and the guarantee bond of the company for the paving work to be secured to cover five years.

The Town Engineer was instructed to survey and stake the Protestant Cemetery and make plan of same.

The question of the unemployed and indigent in town was again discussed without any decision reached, except that there were too many coming in here without chance of employment. The labour supply here exceeds the demand.

Lieut-Governor of Province Honoured By Business Men

Sixty Representatives from North Land Among Those Honouring the Vision and Sincerity of Ontario's Governor, His Honour H. Cockshutt. Mr. R. A. McInnis, Iroquois Falls, One of the Speakers on Noteworthy Occasion.

A remarkable but well-merited tribute of esteem and appreciation was given last week at Toronto to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Henry Cockshutt. A banquet was tendered to the Lieutenant-Governor by the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce, representing the business and industrial interests of the whole Province. There were 425 members and delegates at the banquet in the King Edward Hotel. Of this number fully 60 or 70 were Northern Ontario men. One of the outstanding addresses of the evening was that by Mr. R. A. McInnis, of Iroquois Falls. Among those present from Timmins were Dr. J. A. McInnis, Mayor, Mr. T. F. King, President of the Board of Trade, Councillor F. M. Wallingford, Mr. Norman Laing and G. A. Macdonald.

The event was an unusually pleasing one, the appointments being perfect in every detail, and the occasion one to be long remembered by all present. The addresses were of a high order, and that by the Lieut-Governor was of such value and inspiration that there was general demand for its publication in full, and the Toronto Board of Trade with its

During the evening special attention was paid to the North Land and its resources. In this connection it may not be amiss to mention that the address of Mr. R. A. McInnis was one of particular merit and effectiveness.

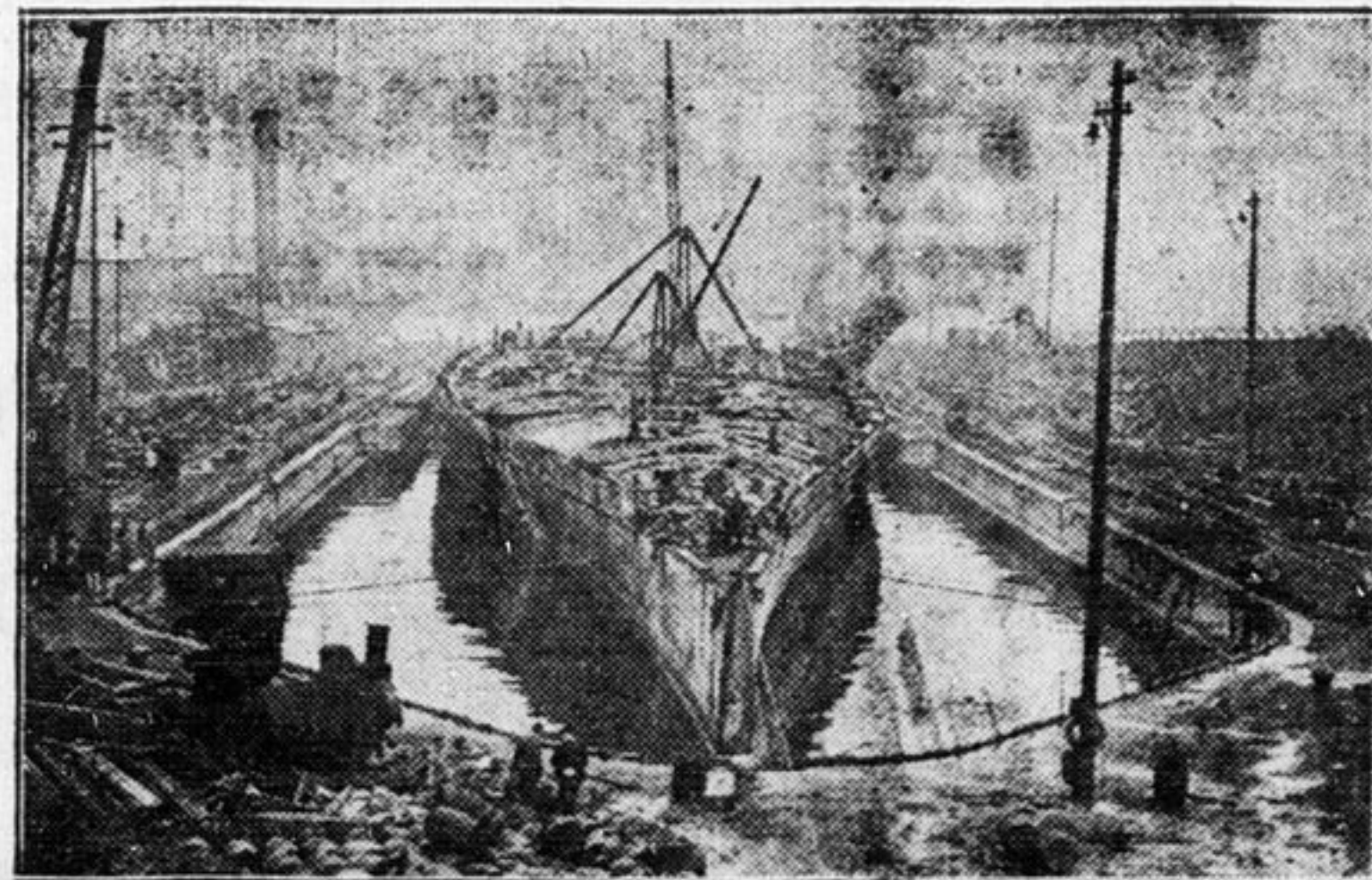
There were about 100 representatives from the North at the Banquet. A powerful appeal for the settlers, especially in the matter of roads was made by Rev. Fr. LaJoie.

FIRST CONFERENCE OF ITS KIND IN THIS SECTION

Aims and Objects of Event Being Held in Timmins on Dec. 5th, 6th and 7th.

The Boys' Work Conference which will be held in Timmins on December 5, 6 and 7, and which is being promoted under the auspices of the Ontario Boys' Work Board, an organization which represents the Protestant forces of Ontario, is one of a series of conferences that are being held throughout the length and breadth of the Province of Ontario. Similar conferences have recently been held in Peterboro, Stratford, London, Guelph and Bolton and one is about to be held in Pembroke on November 28, 29 and 30.

The aim of the conferences might be said to be three-fold: (1) to challenge boys with the things of life that are worth while; (2) to discover and train leadership; and (3) to disseminate information regarding the protestant churches' programme of Religious Education known as the Trail Ranger programme for boys 12 to 14 and the Tuxis programme for boys 15 to 18.

Last year something like 2300 picked older boys and leaders attended some ten boys' work conferences that were held in Ontario.

The Ontario Boys' Work Board also sponsors the Ontario Older Boys' Parliament which is being held during the Christmas holidays in the Legislative Assembly Chambers, Toronto. It is hoped that candidates from the district will address the conference in Timmins.

This is the first conference of this kind that has been held in this section of the province and it is hoped that around 175 or 200 older boys and leaders will be present.

L. A. Buckley, Boys' Work Secretary of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. in Canada, and one of the foremost Boys' Work Leaders in the country, and Mr. C. F. Pfeyman, who is well known in boys' work circles throughout the Province, as he has general oversight over all co-operative boys' work in the Province, will be the leaders at this conference and can be counted upon to make a real contribution.

The conference is open to any older boy, 15 years of age and over, and all men interested in work with boys. The older boys of the district should avail themselves of this wonderful opportunity of meeting these men and enjoying the fellowship and inspiration of this gathering.
