Second Annual Porcupine Poultry Show, Jan. 14 and 15

Large List of Prizes for Big Winter Show. Show to be Held This Year in the Miners' Union Hall, Timmins. The 1925 Event Expected to Surpass Even the Big Success Last Winter.

The Premium Lists for the Second Annual Show of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Association are being issued this week and show a goodly array of prizes in all lines.

The second annual poultry and pet stock show is to be held this winter in the Miners' Union Hall, Second Avenue, opposite the Light and Power office, on Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 14th and 15th, 1925.

There is an extended list of prizes, including ribbons, cups and other trophies, as well as generous cash prizes.

The list of classes includes the popular varieties in Asiatic, American, Mediterranean, English, French, Dutch, Sicilian, Polish, Game, Bantams and other breeds, and in Turkeys, Geese, Ducks, Utility Classes, Dressed Poultry, Eggs, Rabbits, Canaries, Pigeons, etc., etc.

This coming show Dogs will be featured to some extent. The Dog Classes will include:—Airedale Terriers, Boston Terriers, Collies, Fox Terriers, Cocker Spaniels, Chesapeake Bays, Police Dogs, Bull Dogs, Newfoundlanders, Toy Dogs, Setters, and other breeds.

There is also a class for Prize Cats, any variety.

The list of special prizes this year is a noteworthy one and covers a large number of the lines in which most people are interested.

Last winter's Poultry and Pet Stock Show was a very decided success and the coming event (the second annual Poultry Show to be held in Timmins) is expected to be even better than the previous outstanding success.

Included in the Prize List is a review of the Rules and Regulations as adopted by the Society. Exhibitors must pay the \$1.00 membership fee. The premiums are open to the competition of Ontario, except where specifically marked otherwise. All entries must be made on entry forms furnished by the Secretary, and all entry funds must be paid in full at the time entry is made. Mr. F. Charbonneau, Box 1276, Timmins, is the Secretary-Treasurer.

Entries for the big event are to close one day previous to the first day of Show. Stock may be sent by express, charges prepaid, direct to the Secretary, and the same will be placed on exhibition in charge of the Superintendent who will see that it is properly cared for during the Exhibition, and at the close of the Show returned to its owners, and it will therefore be unnecessary for the owners to accompany their exhibits.

The Association will not be responsible for loss by transportation, by fire or otherwise, but will exercise all reasonable vigilance in the care of exhibits, and all specimens must be entered at the risk of owner. No exhibitor will be permitted to handle any birds but his own. This will be enforced to the letter.

Mr. J. M. Cadman, Tillsonburg, Ont., will be the Poultry Judge, and Mr. J. N. Levine, Timmins, Ont., the Judge of Dogs. These are the Judges last year.
