CAMPAIGN CONTINUES FOR PULPWOOD EMBARGO

The campaign continues for an embargo on all pulpwood. It should not be forgotten that already in Ontario there is an embargo on all pulpwood from Crown Lands, so the present campaign resolves itself into an effort merely to prevent the sale of pulpwood from the lands of settlers to United States buyers. Those who are sincere and honest in their advocacy of the embargo are labouring under several misapprehensions. Their chief misconception is the idea that if Ontario discontinues selling pulpwood to the United States the mills in the United States will be forced to erect branches in Canada so as to be able to secure the required pulpwood. There is little to this theory. The United States mills during the past year or two have been buying pulpwood from Sweden. This has been part of the cause of the comparatively low price prevailing in this district for pulpwood. The United States mills have not been buying pulpwood here as freely as in years past, and the resulting disadvantage to the settler gives an idea of the conditions that would prevail with a complete embargo in operation. Stopping the export of pulpwood from Ontario will not bring United States mills to Canada. It will simply further turn the attention of United States mills to European sources of supply.

Another misconception is the belief that to allow Ontario pulpwood to go across to the United States is somehow or another to rob Canada of its resources. So far as the settlers are concerned, either settlement must be brought to a halt or the pulpwood must be cut. If the land is to be cleared, the settlers must take off the pulp. What are they to do with the pulpwood when it is cut? They cannot at present sell it all at profitable figure to the Canadian mills. Will the burning of the pulpwood, or the rotting of the product in piles, assist Ontario as much as the selling of the stuff to United States jobbers?

Talk about protecting the Canadian pulp mills in the matter seems to be far from reasonable. In this part of Ontario, for instance, the Canadian mills have an advantage of about five dollars a cord, in freight charges, over the final cost to the United States mills. That appears to be about all the protection the traffic will stand.

Taking the present year as an example, the settlers are unable to sell their pulpwood at a fair figure. The settlers depend on the sale of pulpwood in large measure for the necessary financial help required in the establishment of their farms and homes. It is their chief source of revenue. Without the money from the sale of pulpwood the settlers are in a bad way. It would appear that more competition in the buying of pulpwood is indeed to be desired rather than further restrictions.

In imputing improper motives to those who are attempting to protect the interest of the settlers, newspapers like The North Bay Nugget and The Sudbury Star are simply throwing their own motives into question. Are they so ready to question the purposes of others because their own motives are not disinterested. When the embargo question was before the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade one Southerner had the impudence to suggest that some of those objecting to the embargo on pulpwood from settlers' land were interested because they were in the "lumber" business. This Southerner had so little knowledge of affairs here was attempting to discuss that he imagined that the pulpwood and lumber business were identical. As a matter of fact there was not a single speaker against the embargo who had any interest in the matter, except the question of right and the matter of a fair show for the settler. If the motives of those advocating an embargo, are as pure as those against, the discussion would naturally be on a higher plane.
