**MAN BORN DEAF AND DUMB
 HEARD RADIO CONCERT**

Strange Story Related by Pembroke
 Clergyman in Church
 Recently.

The Advance takes no responsibility
 for the following, but simply
 passes it on as it appeared in the last
 issue of The Standard, of Pembroke,
 Ontario:—

"To be able to hear and distinguish
 music and to hear a human
 voice for the first time since birth
 was the unusual experience of Mr.
 A. H. Schneider, Hineks St., Satur-
 day evening last.

"Radio—the mystic wonder of the
 present age was responsible for this
 unusual occurrence. Mr. Schneider,
 who has been deaf and dumb since
 birth, walked into the radio demon-
 strating room of Mr. J. M. Cameron
 on Saturday evening last, where a
 Super-hetero-dyne radio set was be-
 ing demonstrated and was connected
 with a loud speaker. After standing
 there a few moments he became ex-
 cited and wrote on his pad that he
 appeared to be hearing something
 very faintly.

"He immediately was supplied
 with ear phones and to his amaze-
 ment, and that of those present, could
 hear quite plainly the concert being
 broadcasted by Station W.G.Y.,
 Schenectady, N.Y. After listening
 in rapt wonder for a few minutes he
 used his writing pad to inform those
 present that he could hear the music
 quite plainly and that he liked it.
 He could also hear the announcer but
 owing to his unfamiliarity with the
 sounds of the human voice could not
 understand him.

"So interested did he become in
 his experience he remained a most at-
 tentive member of the radio audience
 until the station signed off.

"Announcement of this unusual
 event was made from the pulpit of
 Calvin Church Sunday evening by
 Rev. A. W. McIntosh who was advis-
 ing the public of a radio entertain-
 ment being given by the Calmax
 Club.

**INTERPROVINCIAL BODY
 BACKS SMOOTH ROCK IDEA.**

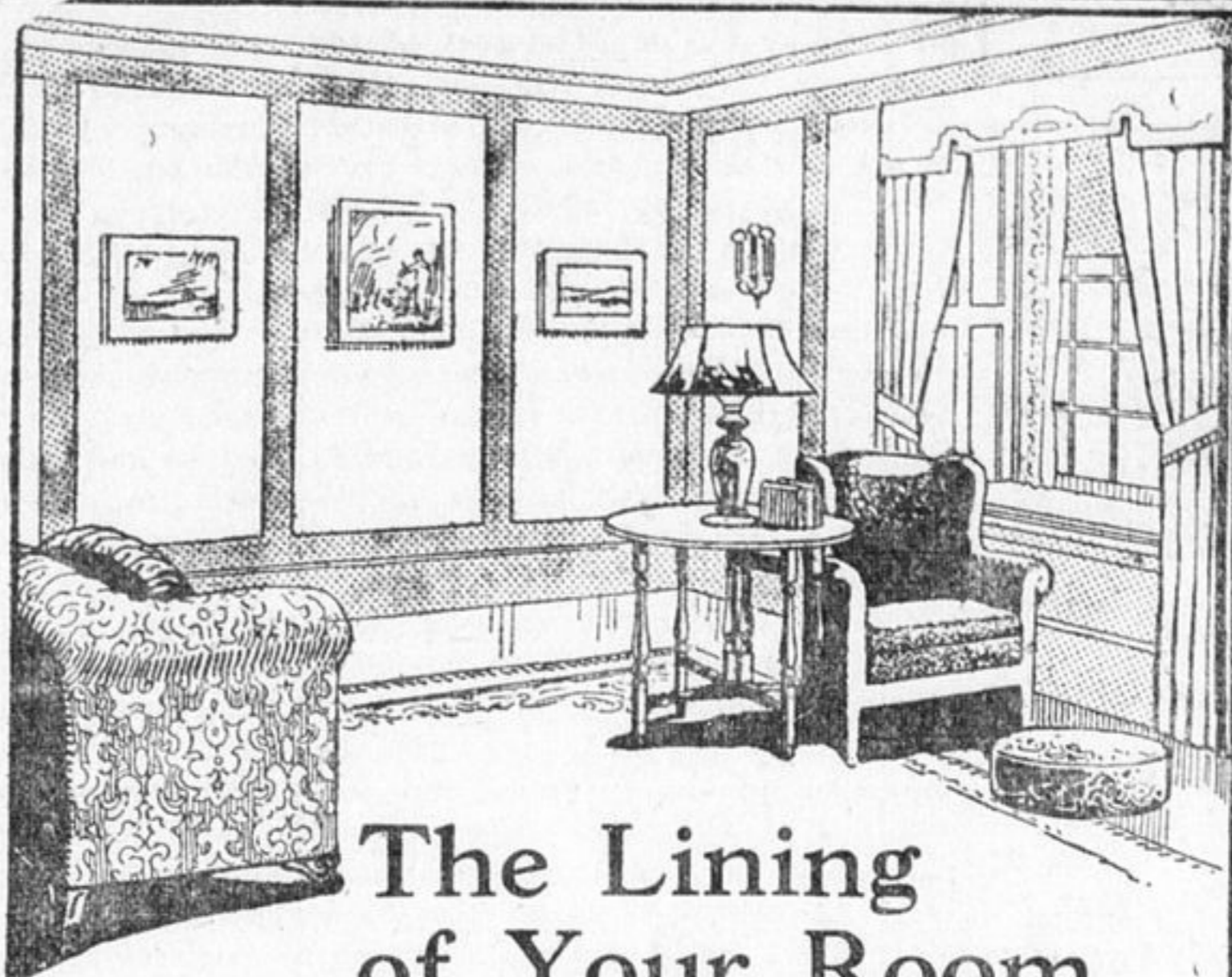
At the meeting at Iroquois Falls
 some months ago of the Associated
 Boards of Trade of Temiskaming and
 Northern Ontario, Smooth Rock Falls
 Board of Trade had a resolution for-
 ward with the idea of recommending
 to the Ontario Government that each
 and every person operating a motor
 vehicle be required to secure a license.
 The fact that Smooth Rock Falls is
 absolutely without roads, was taken
 to prove the unselfish thought for oth-
 ers that actuated the resolution.
 There was considerable discussion on
 this resolution at the Associated
 Boards of Trade meeting, some ques-
 tioning the desirability of a resolu-
 tion of this character. In this con-
 nection it is very interesting now to
 note that the Interprovincial Roads
 Conference at the Parliament Build-
 ings, Toronto, last week gave unani-
 mous approval to the principle of all
 motor drivers being licensed. This
 Conference included representative
 men of all the Provinces, all the re-
 presentatives being men who have
 given special study to roads and high-
 way traffic problems. In referring
 to the session at which the license
 question came up, The Toronto Globe
 said:—"Unanimous approval of the
 principle of licensing each and every
 person operating a motor vehicle was
 registered at the Interprovincial
 Roads Conference at the Parliament
 Buildings during its sitting just
 closed, and recommendations for-
 ward to the various Provincial Govern-
 ments that the principle be adopt-
 ed throughout Canada. It is under-
 stood the Ontario Government will
 take that important step at the com-
 ing session. The Province of Quebec,
 the committee finds, at the present
 time requires all drivers to have a
 license for operating a vehicle, and
 collects a \$5.00 fee for such. Such
 license is also required in the Pro-
 vince of Prince Edward Island, where
 a five-dollar tax includes the owner
 and one member of the family."
 "In the opinion of the conference it
 was felt that it was in the interest
 of the public safety that such mea-
 sures be adopted, in order to curtail
 reckless driving. The cancellation of
 such permits for serious infractions
 would be one of the penalties im-
 posed."

John Bedford, 41 years of age,
 married, with two children, was
 fatally injured last week when
 struck by a piece of falling rock in
 the Teck-Hughes Mine at Kirkland
 Lake. Bedford was engaged in
 shaft sinking and was below a buck-
 et of rock which tipped. He lived
 seven hours after the accident. A
 coroner's jury returned a verdict of
 accidental death.
