Mail your Christmas parcels early and give the Post Office a chance to deliver them in good time and undamaged. You get better service by avoiding the rush period so do not wait until the last minute, says one of the circulars. Also be sure to pack carefully and address fully. Give your mail the attention you want it to receive.

Those who post parcels of merchandise for the United States, says the circular, should understand that these parcels are sent by the Canadian post Offices to a United States border customs office and not direct to the office named in the address. At this border customs office the parcels are examined for customs duty. Owing to the immense volume of business at the Christmas season there is apt to be delay in the handling of the parcels and the public are advised to post all Christmas parcels for the United States in exceptionally good
