MUSICAL MINSTREL REVUE AT SCHUMACHER. FRIDAY

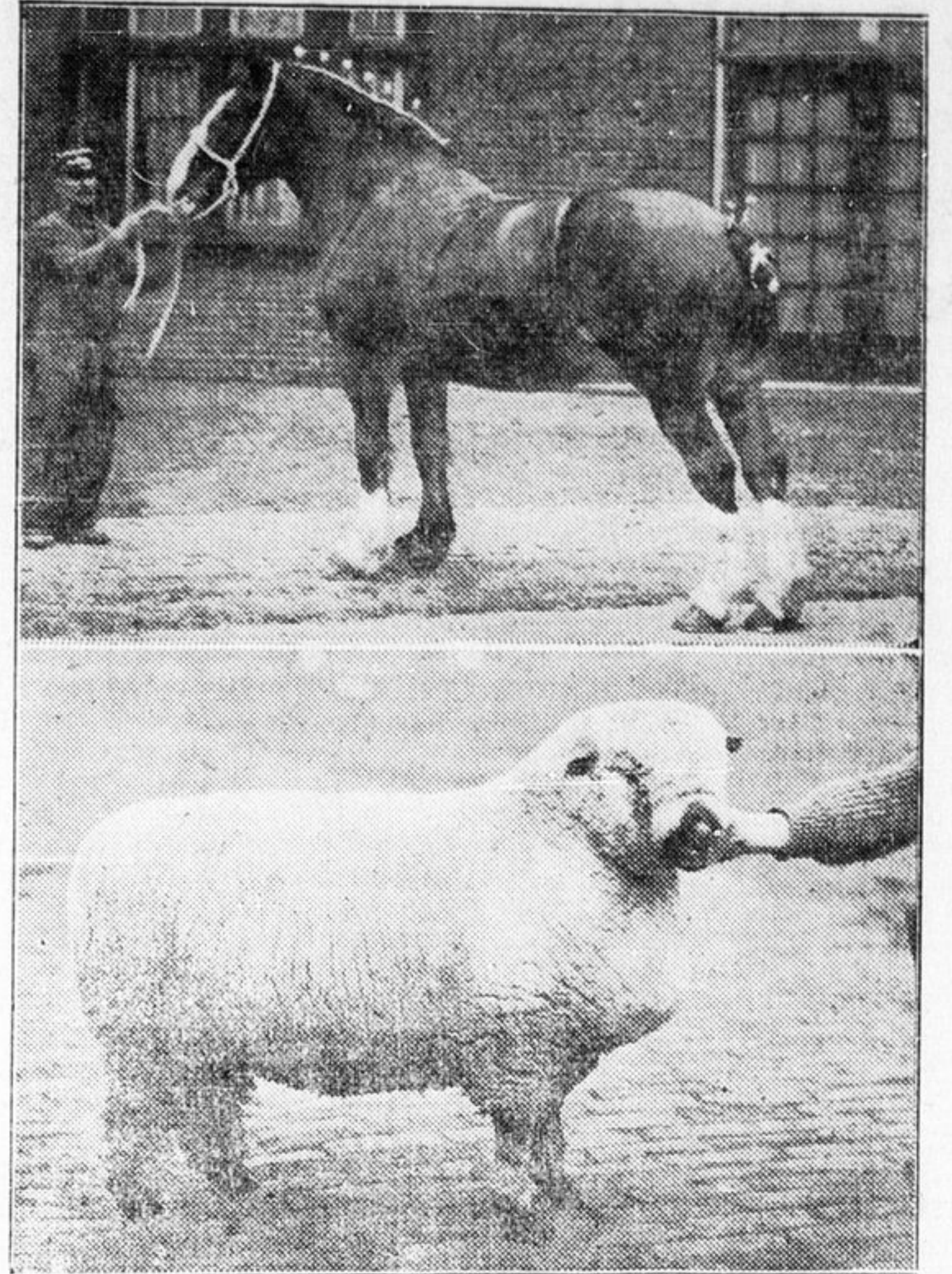
Under the Auspices of the Schumacher Ratepayers' Association.

CANADIAN CHAMPIONS OF CHICAGO INTERNATIONAL LIVE STOCK SHOW



"Chief," champion heavy draft Clydesdale (gelding) owned by the Manitoba Cartage Warehouse Company of Winnipeg, and a Shropshire Ewe owned by J. W. Gurney, Paris, Ontario, were among the Canadian stock winning championships.

Canadians won some of the most coveted honors at the International Live Stock Exposition and Hay and Grain Show. Farmers from the Dominion, competing with the best exhibitors that the United States could produce, won a good share of the championships and blue ribbons.

One of the outstanding victories from a Canadian viewpoint, was the winning of the world's wheat championship by J. C. Mitchell, of Dakhinda, Sask., a victory he had scored in 1919 and 1920. He won this championship in both entries with a bushel of Marquis Spring wheat. The prize nets him \$675, of which \$500 is given by the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, \$150 by the Saskatchewan Government and \$25 by the International Show. Canada has won the world's wheat championship thirteen times out of fourteen. The international competition began fourteen years ago.
