### BE VERY CAREFUL WITH CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

They Are Not Included in the Ordinary Fire Risks, Says C.F.U. Secretary.

John A. Robertson, secretary of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, has sent out the following letter to fire chiefs all over the province:

I beg to draw your attention to the danger of life and property from Christmas decorations, such as draperies, scenery, cotton to represent snow, etc. Displays of this nature, and the lighting arrangements in connection therewith, add very considerably to the ordinary risks of fire.

I would also point out that should an accident of the kind occur in a crowded store or meeting, the rapid spread of fire in such inflammable material is almost certain to occasion a panic with attendant risks of life and limb. The National Fire Protection Association and the Ontario Fire Marshall recommend that all fabrics for decoration purposes should be immersed in a solution of Commercial Ammonium Phosphate in the proportion of one pound of Phosphate to one gallon of water. If then slightly wrung and dried they will offer considerable resistance to fire until again washed.

If this is not practicable, a few simple precautions may reduce the danger to a minimum, and these should be considered essential where large numbers of people and particularly children are to be gathered.

See that inflammable material is clear of and not hung over heating and lighting devices, steam pipes, stovepipes, electric light bulbs, etc.

See that your electrical circuits are properly fused and not overloaded by the addition of temporary lights.

Examine your fire extinguishing appliances and see that they are sufficient, in good order and readily accessible.

See that all exits are plainly marked and not obstructed.

Remember that nothing can render these displays absolutely safe, and that if accidents are not to mar the festive season, constant vigilance and care must be exercised.

### DEATH OF BROTHER OF CAPT. CORNTHWAITE, S.A.

Last week Capt. Cornthwaite, S. A., was called to Sudbury, owing to the death there of his brother. His many friends here will extend sincere sympathy to Capt. Cornthwaite in his bereavement. In reference to the death The Sudbury Star last week says:—

"After an illness of over two years, William Cornthwaite, a veteran of the Great War, and for the past 12 years a resident of Sudbury, passed away at his home shortly

after midnight last night. Deceased, who was 45 years of age, came to Canada and to Sudbury twelve years ago and in 1916 enlisted with the 227th battalion here. He served in France until the close of the war. About four years ago his health began to fail and when his condition became serious he was taken to Toronto for special treatment. Hopes were held for his recovery until about six months ago, when it was found that nothing could be done for him and he returned home. He leaves to mourn his loss, with his widow, seven children, four daughters and three sons, the eldest of which is 21 years of age. The funeral will be held at three o'clock on Monday afternoon from his late residence, to the G.W.V.A. club rooms and thence to the Church of the Epiphany, where Rev. P. F. Bull will conduct the ceremony. Interment will be made in the veterans' plot in the Church of England cemetery."

The Northern News last week says:—"The chicken house, a former Toronto street car, together with 44 birds, owned by Milton Austin, Haileybury, went up in smoke last Friday evening. Apparently a spark had dropped on the floor and had smouldered for some hours. There had been no fire in the stove since early in the day. The owner heard the alarm, telephoned to find out where the fire was and learned from central it was in his own back yard. Only one rooster survived the fire."
