### Falls Seniors Win on Their Own Ice With Score of 10-2

Timmins Seniors Lose Second Game in N.O.H.A. Series. Match Was Much Livelier Than Score Would Indicate. Referee Did Not Find Favour With Fans. Timmins Boys Fell Down Through not Going in for Combination.

In a game which was spoiled from the spectators point of view for supporters of both teams, by the referee, and witnessed by about one hundred fans from this Camp, who had travelled over by special train, Timmins went down to their second defeat on Saturday night in the Iroquois Falls Arena, when the Eskimos were the victors by 10-2. This score could not be called a fair criterion of the play; the game was not slow, but the locals lost through not playing combination. McIntyre in the nets played a good game; the goals which passed him were from close in, and he had no chance at any. This was Roach's first game, and though he played well, he was not so effective as he would have been had he appeared in the previous game played at Timmins against New Liskeard. Duval made his initial appearance on the Timmins defence. He always plays a good game, and on Saturday evening, though he failed to get his usual goal, his pass was responsible for the first Timmins counter. Davidson at centre did not show up as well as he did against Liskeard. Parker and Kelly on the wings worked hard. Kelly persistently checked into the Falls men, and spoiled a lot of good combination very effectively. McDonald and Desormeaux were not used much, but while on the ice put up a fair game.

Powers in the Falls nets was not kept so busy as McIntyre, but he had lots of work to do. Boucher played a great game. The erstwhile Sudbury badman never drew a penalty, and played a gentleman's game throughout. Leclair was not so good but worked hard. Cybulski at centre played a good game. Fahey and Chirooski on the wings were good. Fahey is a dangerous man. He figured in five of the goals scored for the Falls, and knows when to pass the puck when it is apt to be the most effective. King and McConomy, the two subs played a fair game while on the ice.

Mr. O. Frood of New Liskeard was referee, and though neither team got any breaks from him, he could have given better satisfaction during the first two periods, by forgetting occasionally that he held the bell in his hands. Again at various times

rushes of both teams were spoiled when they ran into the referee, and as one spectator put it, "Frood should be sent to the box for kicking the puck." Both teams drew ten penalties each, mostly for minor offences, or accidents.

The first period opened with end-to-end rushes being the order of the day. Chirooski drew the first of the numerous penalties of this period when he tripped Duval when the Miner's defence man was going through the Falls defence. Boucher and Leclair tried end to end rushes but could not tally. Kelly came down in a burst of speed, getting through the dangerous Falls defence, only to have Powers make a very nice save. Parker drew the first Timmins penalty at this time, Powers the Falls goaltender keeping him company for one minute. Roach went off as Powers returned to the ice, when he tripped Leclair. Right after, Kelly went off for tripping Cybulski. The Miners were now shy two men, and the Eskimos rushed up a five man forward line. McIntyre was kept busy for a while, but he handled the rain of shots sent in on him very nicely. With an open net in front of him Fahey missed a pass, and Roach went down the ice, shooting from outside the Falls defence. Fahey sent in a hard one, McIntyre handling it nicely. Right after Fahey

came down, passed to McConomy who sent one past McIntyre, twelve and a half minutes from the start of the game. Fahey was sent to the penalty box for a rest. Duval came down beating the Falls defence, but held the puck too long, Powers using the whole length of his stick to save. King went off for tripping Parker. With the Eskimos two men shy Timmins made great efforts to score, but though they had numerous shots on the Falls net, none could pass Powers. Roach and Fahey went to the box when they mixed it. Davidson joining them for loafing. Chirooski was sent to the box for interference. With the Falls one man shy, and the Miners pressing hard the gong rang, Falls 1. Timmins 0.

The second period opened with the general consensus of opinion that the game was still anybody's, but Boucher soon dispelled that idea when he sent in the second Falls counter one minute and thirty-five seconds from the start of the period. Two minutes later Chirooski made it three when he took Fahey's pass and sent one from close in past McIntyre which the Goldminer had no chance against. Timmins forced the play, but could not get any combination going. King went off for slashing Duval. Desormeaux and Fahey going off for mixing it against the boards at the Falls end of the rink. Fahey came out of the penalty box in time to intercept McDonald who was coming down with the puck, McDonald replaced Fahey in the box when he tripped the latter. Fahey returned to the box when he started to carry on an animated conversation with Mr. Frood while the game was in progress. McIntyre was making some fine saves at this time, until Boucher came down, trying a shot from out, King going in for the rebound, missing and Boucher scoring the fourth for the Falls from close in on McIntyre. Duval got through the Falls defence but shot wild, going to the box right after tripping Fahey. The period was seventeen minutes old when Cybulski took Fahey's pass and made it five for the Eskimos. Cybulski collided with Parker's stick and went down. The referee following

the precedent established early in the game, looked to find a culprit and Parker went to the box. When Duval came down for a shot on the Falls net, Fahey was sent to the box for apparently with Boucher's assistance giving the dangerous Miners defence man a clean check. With fifty seconds to go Duval passed out from behind the net to Parker who scored the first Timmins goal. Forty seconds later Fahey on a lone effort made it six for the Falls. Falls 6. Timmins 1.

The third opened with Davidson sending a long shot in on Powers. Cybulski came down and half-a-minute from the face-off sent in the seventh for the Falls from Fahey's pass. Kelly tried a close-in one, when he checked Boucher but failed to pass Powers. Leclair sent in the Eskimos eighth when the period was nearly a minute old. The Miners came back strong, but showed a regrettable lack of any form of combination. Kelly was working hard at this time backchecking like a fiend, and it was good to see him go into Boucher, and take the puck away from the big Falls defence man. Cybulski sent in the ninth from close in. Timmins tried again to get one past, but contented themselves with individual play, and shooting in the main from outside the defence. The period was thirteen minutes old when McConomy took Boucher's pass and sent in the last counter for the Falls. Two minutes later Kelly came down fooled Boucher nicely and sent in the second and last Timmins counter. Roach went off for trying to trip Boucher. The Falls tried to get one past McIntyre but could not. With Roach's return to the ice the Miners made a determined attempt, but could not get in. The gong rang with the Falls the victors by ten to two.
